Dear Friends

There's a saying which describes Christians as 'Easter people living in a Good Friday World'. Sadly, the church has not always lived up to this description. If it had, then in 2,000 years, we would surely have won the whole world to Christ by now. So, how can we recover what it means to be 'Easter people living in as Good Friday World'?

As Easter people, we remember that Christ has died and Christ has risen! As a result, everything has been changed for all time. We know about the power of God's love that's been released into the world. We know it's sufficient to change everything, to change all of us, for the better. And we have the Holy Spirit to give us strength and inspiration to share this power with others.

However, we also live in a Good Friday world. Jesus' own experience on that first Good Friday shows the kind of world we live in. It is broken, people suffer with pain and hurt, and there's rebellion against God's ways. This world is a beautiful place and there are many wonderful, kind, caring and loving people living here. But even the best of us are sinners who need a Saviour – and probably the good people are in the minority.

I believe that the vast majority of people know that they are sinners, but they don't know how to change. When Jesus looked at the society of his day – in all their sin and need – he didn't condemn them, but He looked at them with compassion. He saw that the vast majority of people were 'harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd' (Matthew 9:36). It is vital that we see people the way Jesus saw them. We are not here to judge others, but to share the Good News of the Gospel with people who need to find a way out of their hopelessness, a way back to God, a way of living that will bless others!

Yes, we live in a Good Friday world, but we live as Easter people. Pope John Paul II said several years ago: "Do not abandon yourselves to despair, for we are the Easter People, and 'Hallelujah!' is our song".

Prayer Cycle

We pray for those who live on:

- The clients of the Churches Together in West Wickham Work Club. Pray that new volunteers will come forward and that the help and advice received from the Work Club will enable the clients to find jobs.
- South Sudan, where a famine has been declared and the country is in the grip of a humanitarian catastrophe following more than three years of conflict. This has resulted in tens of thousands of deaths and the displacement of 3 million people. Pray that our collections during Christian Aid Week in May will go some way toward helping this organisation to meet the needs of these people, as well as the other good work that they are involved with.
- Our plans to open up our church in the next few months for concerts and lunchtime recitals as well as offering a listening ear and coffee on occasion. We give thanks for the near completion of our lighting project and pray that the church will be seen as a Place of Welcome in West Wickham.
- Those who are sick or in some kind of need at this time. Pray that we might be open to God's nudging where there is help that we can provide to individuals that we know.
- Scouting groups in West Wickham. Pray that the District Event on St George's Day will promote the scouting movement and generate interest in the organisation.



Update on West Wickham Group Ministry

Before I came to West Wickham, there was a meeting between three churches (St Francis', St John's and St Mary's) to discuss the possibility of becoming a Team Ministry. At this meeting it was clear that no-one was ready for such a change and the idea was put on hold with the agreement to strengthen the way in which the three churches work together as a group.

New patterns of working together take time to establish, especially when they are based on brand new relationships. Over the past 18 months, the clergy of the three churches have met a few times and there has been some working together (for example, when St John's ran an Autumn Fair at St Francis' church hall in October 2016). We are now embarking on a number of new joint projects, including a presence at the West Wickham Village Day in Blake's Park on Monday 1 May. Here we are planning a family-friendly fun area, where there will be ride-on toys and a soft-play area for very young children, as well as large, lawn-based games and craft activities for older children and adults. This will be located next to a seating area which is sponsored by the Churches Together in West Wickham, where we can provide information on the activities that go on in our three churches.

In order to make this a success, there are some things that we will need to provide from St Francis' and St Mary's, the main one being people. If you are available on Monday 1 May, please would you sign up on a rota for an hour (or more) in one of the activities where help is needed (transport, set-up and take-down, children's activities and meeting with those who use the seating area).

We hope that this will be the start of being able to do more events together with St John's (and other churches), so that we are no longer reliant only on our own resources and we can build on the great work that each of the churches currently does. Please do be encouraging of any joint working together which happens so that we can make the most of what God is doing amongst us.

Bishop Richard writes . . .

“Live simply that others may simply live” is a sentiment that has been common for at least a generation. It is sometimes first attributed to Mahatma Gandhi. Since that time, life has become far more complex, with the rise of the Internet and the digital age; far more unfair with growing inequality (Oxfam recently reporting that the wealthiest eight individuals have more than the bottom half of the entire world’s population); and far more unstable (with climate change, many intractable conflicts, the worst refugee crisis since the Second World War, and a fragile global economic system).

March saw the beginning of Lent and it is a very good time for Christians to reflect on how we live amidst all the challenges of today’s world and not least whether it is truly time to be much more serious about the matter of living simply. One of the problems in this, and perhaps particularly so in Lent, is how to avoid this being seen in a very negative, “hairshirt” kind of way which simply puts everyone off. However, Lent, and our Christian faith and tradition, offer much more positive way of thinking about living simply.

Jesus said very clearly that we cannot serve both God and Mammon. The Archbishop of Canterbury’s Lent book speaks of “Dethroning Mammon”. The thinking behind this suggests that our pursuit of unbridled gain can enslave us and when we learn to put God truly at the centre of our lives we are genuinely liberated. Of course, we need a well-functioning financial system which produces in an efficient and fair way the goods and services which we all need and depend upon. The danger is that it gets out of control, and instead of being a servant becomes the master.

This year’s Lent Call focuses on projects from our Link Dioceses in Zimbabwe, which concentrate on food security. In 2016 it was estimated that over a quarter of the population of Zimbabwe needed support in finding enough to eat. This problem has been exacerbated

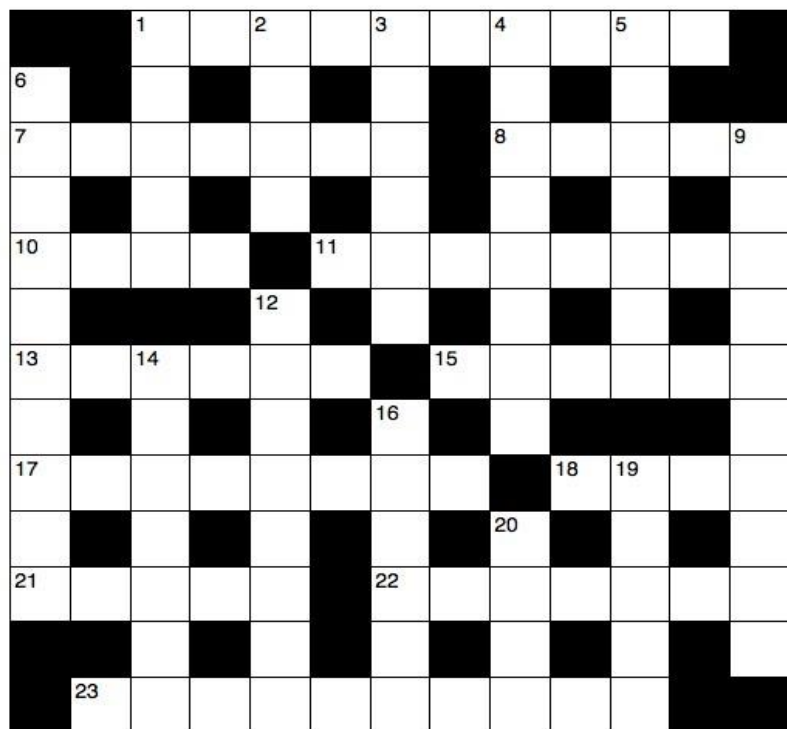
by the effects of climate change, which are damaging crops in Zimbabwe severely. By giving to the Lent Call, perhaps through money saved by some more simple living ourselves (for example by eating less meat), we will be doing a small amount to help the situation and for those affected to simply live. Similarly, many people across the globe do not have access to reliable and clean water. 22 March was World Water Day, and drew attention to the very real challenge of redressing this damaging and death-dealing situation. In past years we have supported the provision of bore holes in some of our Link Dioceses – a life-giving move for the communities they help.

During Lent we are seeking to understand and live more deeply the mystery of God’s sacrificial and transforming love made known in the life and death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As we move through Lent and participate in the services of holy week and Easter, let us pray that our lives and world may be deeply shaped by this love and that we may all learn to “live simply that others may simply live”.
