Collect

Creator of the heavens, who led the Magi by a star to worship the Christ-child: guide and sustain us, that we may find our journey's end in Jesus Christ our Lord.

First Reading: Ephesians 3:1-12

This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles— ² for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given to me for you, ³ and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, 4 a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. 5 In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: 6 that is, the Gentiles have become fellow-heirs. members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel. ⁷ Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given to me by the working of his power. 8 Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, ⁹ and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; 10 so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in

the heavenly places. ¹¹ This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, ¹² in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Gospel Reading Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ² asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' ³ When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴ and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where

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the Messiah was to be born. ⁵ They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

6 "And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. 8 Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' 9 When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it

stopped over the place where the child was. 10 When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. 11 On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. 12 And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod. they left for their own country by another road.

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REFLECTION – Hazel O'Sullivan

Here we are at the start of a New Year. At this time each year, we remember the three wise men who were guided by a star. This is the Feast of Epiphany and it's a way of taking the light and that joy of Christmas into the New Year. I wonder what you will take from Christmas this year to guide you through 2023.

It's almost like we stand at a crossroad, and we have a choice of which direction to go:

• We can follow the ways of this world, and in this context, I hope that there is some good news to give you sustenance and to guide you during the year. You may have done a review of 2022 for inclusion in a Christmas letter. For example, my son graduated this year from his engineering degree and in September all my husband's family met at his nephew's wedding in Ireland – both of these were joyous occasions. Even if you haven't had anything like this to report on, maybe you had some good food at Christmas that you can remember. Or maybe you have a joyful event coming up this year – maybe a significant birthday, the birth of a child or a new home.

The problem with following the ways of the world is that the joy and celebration of these events is quickly forgotten about.

• Another possible route at the crossroads is Christ's way – way of the star. Down this route, there is <u>always</u> good news to tell. In this week's reading from the letter to the Ephesians, Paul writes about being given God's grace to pass on to others news of the riches and mystery of Christ. If I was to do a review of 2022 from the perspective of my meetings with Jesus, I'd tell someone about the retreat in February that I took which indicated that I wanted to get to know Jesus better, and then how my sabbatical in November gave me a taste of a contemplative life. Do ask me about either of these – they are both experiences that I'll never forget, just as I'll never forget that Jesus was born as God with Us and died so that we might have 'overwhelming joy'.

I have illustrated how both these ways – the way of the world and Christ's way - can lead us down a path of joy and celebration for the year ahead. I'd hope that when you experience something good, you want to tell others about it and so these events stretch some way further down that path of joy and celebration than just to the first week of the year, maybe producing some kind of positive transformation in you. I wonder, has anyone ever said to you, 'Your face lit up when you told me about such and such', or 'When you came back from that retreat, or holiday, or church service, you seemed like a different person'?

This is exactly what happened to the three wise men. When they stood at a crossroads they had a choice of which direction to go in – the ways of the world, or Christ's way. They'd been following this star for a very long time, and it had led them so close to Jerusalem that, at that point, they thought they knew the answer to the question "Where is the King?". They thought this was obvious and that they'd meet a king by going straight for the royal palace where they'd be able to share in the joy and celebration that was going on.

When they got there of course, there wasn't any celebrating happening. Even when they told King Herod that they were looking for a child who'd been born king of the Jews, he didn't seem too happy at this news. He wasn't prepared to hear the good news. I wonder if we're sometimes in a similar situation, and shut our ears to good news at times. It's easy to do, partly because the world is much better at telling us bad news - TV, newspapers and the internet bombard us with images of terror, violence, hunger, exploitation and misery. And, as well as national and global events which are happening and can make us oblivious to good news stories, we also have difficulties in our own lives which make hearing good news more problematic. We don't want to deny that these bad things are happening, but let's not allow them to block out something good that God might be doing at the same time. In our own community, we've had two recent deaths, so we might be alert at this time to more sad news than happy events. This is why it's always helpful to remember that those who have died are now in a place where there's no more crying or pain and we can be happy that they died with faith in Christ.

The wise men were distracted from following Christ's way for a short time, but they got back on track and continued to follow the star. And when they finally got to Bethlehem they were transformed by their encounter with the infant Jesus. Meeting him changed their approach to their journeying, such that they returned home by another route.

Jesus Christ is the Light of the World. For so many people today, that light has already dimmed and they've not been transformed because they're not following Christ's way. We had so many in the churches at Christingle and Lighting the Lamps. Why was this? They were coming to see the light – a light that's so desperately needed at this time. They were coming to meet with Jesus. And I pray that they all did take some of that light which he offers away with them. However, it is easy to get diverted off the path, as the Three Wise Men found out.

Jesus Christ is the Light of the World. He is Good News. We have something that the rest of the world does not have. Please do use our nativity scene (or one that you might have at home) to gain a sense of joy in Jesus Christ born on earth. The nativity scenes in the churches will stay up until 40 days after Christmas — a festival we call

Candlemas. And this is a time when we <u>still</u> remember Jesus as the Light of the World, through the candles that we bless and light on that day – candles to take us through the rest of the year. This is a way that recognises a longer lasting joy, which is to be celebrated.

What will guide you through 2023? Will it be the ways of this world, or will it be Jesus, the Light of the World, just like the star that lit up when Jesus was born and was the light which the wise men followed.

Later in the service we'll have an opportunity for you to recall moments in your life when you've felt yourself to be transformed in some way, or things that you are thankful for. I pray that this way of Christ is what will guide you during the year ahead, so that you can be transformed through any number of further encounters with Jesus. And if you're looking for opportunities to have these encounters, Richard suggested a few in his talk last week. I've included these in the pew sheet for this week for any of those who missed them.

Let's make 2023 a year of joy and celebration by following Christ's way – the way of the star.

Prayer Pointers

Pray for guidance as we try to show the light of Christ. Pray for God's blessing on all who lead and teach Christians in this community. Pray that we may learn truth and be filled with the power of the Holy Spirit.

In the Southwark Diocesan Prayer Cycle, pray for ministers and congregations in the churches of Dulwich Deanery and for The Revd Canon Dr Martin Gainsborough who has recently been appointed as the new Bishop of Kingston

Pray for an end to street violence across London. Pray for the victim of the fatal stabbing in Peckham Rye and for the victims of the shooting in Camberwell, the stabbing in West Croydon and the stabbing in West Dulwich. Pray that those responsible may be brought to justice.

Pray that the leaders of countries around the world may understand the need for peace and for justice. Guide those with power to use it well and honestly. Hold before God the continuing war in Ukraine and for a just and peaceable solution.

Pray for all those working in the NHS especially those who work under extreme pressure in Accident and Emergency Departments.

Give thanks for all who have volunteered to staff the warm spaces in West Wickham and pray for those who have come in as they cannot afford to heat their homes.

Pray for those who have spent time over Christmas with family and friends, but are now back home alone, and perhaps lonely. Pray that they will remember that they are loved, by others and by God.

In our congregations pray for these who are experiencing ill health by name –Mark Outten, Vicky Pearce, Mike East, Pat Allegacone, Jane Smith (and her mother), Joan Burford, Graham Stone, Rowena Griffiths, Daphne Dack, John Dack, Barbara Goodchild, Karen Plummer, Miriam Richards and Mary Sanders – and those known to God alone.

Hold before God all those who have died in the faith of Christ crucified. Pray especially for Tony Goodchild and for Barbara and Tony's family, and for Barbara Plummer and for Katie and Barbara's family. Thank God for their examples of faithful service over many years in St Francis. May they hear their Master's voice saying 'Well done, good and faithful servants.'
