Dear Friends

Having disgraced myself in the October-November parish magazine by attributing Keats' *Ode to Autumn* to Samuel Coleridge, let me assure you that the lines I am about to quote were, indeed, penned by Alfred, Lord Tennyson: "In spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love." (*Locksley Hall*). And before anyone emails me to point out that I can hardly refer to myself as a young man, may I ask you whether you still recognise 14 February by going out for dinner or sending a Valentine card? Surely I'm not the only romantic in the parish!

Factual information on St Valentine is not easy to come by. All that can reliably be said is that Valentine was his name and that he was martyred and buried at a cemetery on the Via Flaminia, close to the Ponte Milvio to the north of Rome on 14 February, probably in 269 AD. So, why has he become the patron saint of lovers (as well as of bee keepers, epilepsy, fainting, greetings, happy marriages, love, plague, travellers, and young people!)? Probably because of the legends attached to him.

The Roman Emperor, Claudius the Cruel (268-290 AD), was prevented by law from drafting married men into the army and, being short of soldiers, banned marriage between younger citizens. Nevertheless, Valentine, a priest, continued to conduct illegal wedding ceremonies, maintaining that marriage was part of God's plan and purpose for the world. This led to his arrest and execution, but not before Valentine fell in love with his jailer's daughter and, on the evening of his execution, passed her a note reading, "From your Valentine."

Although the Church of England doesn't include St Valentine's Day as one of its festivals, when a few years ago St Valentine's Day fell on a Sunday, it was suggested that its churches hold services with a love theme and an order of service was provided. The gospel chosen was John 15:9-17, in which the words "love" or "loved" occur no less than nine times.

Jesus invites his followers "to abide in his love." He then clarifies what this means by adding that "If you keep my commandments, you will abide (or remain) in my love." He then goes on to explain, twice, what the most significant of those commandments is: "Love each other."

We shall soon be celebrating Maundy Thursday, which derives its name from the Latin "mandatum," meaning "commandment." At the Last Supper, St John records that after washing his disciples' feet, Jesus gave them a new commandment, "Love one another." He then goes on to say, "By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."

And that commandment holds true for our church today: we should be a community that is recognised for the care that we take of each other, particularly, but not only when our members are going through difficult times, and sometimes, maybe, at a cost to ourselves.

<u>Paraclesis</u> <u>Making our Church Family/Community Distinctive</u>

At baptism renewal services in January, we thought about how our faith journey is one where we are aiming to become more like Christ. One of the things that we can do to reflect Christ to others is to journey with and care for others, especially in difficult times, as a reminder that God is there with us in these times. During Lent our home groups and two other groups will be meeting to follow a course called 'Paraclesis'. This is all about coming alongside others in the journey of life.

The course includes sermon materials as well as videos and topics for discussion in small groups. This will strengthen the culture of care in both our churches, supporting what goes on in the home groups, from the pastoral care team and within individual friendships. We will start on Sunday 24 February with a joint service at St Mary's, looking at the story of the Good Samaritan. The service on that day will be followed by a brunch – a chance to spend an extended time talking to others and making new friends with those you might not normally have a chance to speak with. St Mary's have found that such occasions are very helpful in strengthening and encouraging the church family.

The Paraclesis material is relevant to everybody as we will all have situations where we want to offer God's care to someone (a family member or a friend maybe) but we might not know where to start or how to make the offer. - Benefice of St Francis' & St Mary's Lifting of Suspension of Presentation - following discussion with the Diocese, the Bishop has lifted the suspension of presentation as St Francis', St Mary's and St John's will not become a Team Ministry and therefore there was a vacancy at St Francis' and St Mary's for a Vicar. There is legal requirement for both St Francis' and St Mary's PCCs to pass a resolution to appoint Hazel O'Sullivan as Vicar. Hazel left the room and the PCC approved the resolution that Hazel would become Vicar. A special service will be held in 2019 for the Bishop and Archdeacon to officiate.
- Safeguarding Audit Kim Teare, Parish Safeguarding Officer, presented the annual report.
- Youth Group regular group of young people that came along each Sunday evening and were looking to involve them in more Church activities over the coming months.
- Gift Day £2166.80 had been raised including Gift Aid to be split equally between Croydon Nightwatch and St Francis' Church Maintenance Programme.
- Deanery Synod report from meeting in October given by Barbara Goodchild.
- Date of next meeting Tuesday 5 February 2019.

Whilst adults are welcome to just sit, we hope they will feel like joining in.


