In addition to these events, on Maundy Thursday evening West Wickham & Shirley Baptist Church will have the Riding Lights Theatre Company performing *The Narrow Road*, which is a theatre and worship event that follows Jesus' footsteps to the cross and beyond. The event is free: doors open at 7.00 pm and it will start at 7.30 pm.

St George's Day

St George will be remembered as the patron saint for scouting at our special joint service on **Sunday 28 April** in St Mary's Church at 10.00 am. We will be joined by all groups from the 7th West Wickham Scout Troop for this service, so please do make an effort to support it and generate greater community links that were very much in evidence when we joined them for their Quiz Night in early March.

- For projects in Zimbabwe which offer income-generating initiatives for the church.

Pray for unity in our world and our country, which have been shaken by events in Christchurch, New Zealand, by the increase in knife and gun crime on our city streets and by the divisions created by the Brexit process.

Dear Friends

The lengthening days in spring always make me feel better. Currently in mid-March we are gaining an extra three or four minutes of daylight every day and this can be a great boost to human health. Daylight enhances mood and increases energy through the release of endorphins, which trigger a positive feeling in the body, similar to that given by morphine.

Having Easter at this time of year gives a great synchronicity between the calendar year and the liturgical year. Although Lent is sometimes seen as a depressing time, with the focus on penitence, this is an important practice as it shows the contrast when we compare life <u>with</u> sinful behaviours to the life that we're offered when we give them up and turn towards God.

During Lent we are letting God's light shine into our lives. This is partly to shine a light into those dark places, where we might need to be penitent, but it's also a time to turn towards God in new behaviours, whether that be in prayer, in meeting with other Christians or in increased generosity of time and other resources. Letting God's light shine into our lives means that at Easter, the highlight of the church year, we can really proclaim the Good News that Jesus gave us: a deeper personal relationship with God, bringing life in all its fullness.

So, I wonder how much more of God there is in your life at Easter, compared to the beginning of Lent. This year there will be four extra hours of daylight on Easter Sunday, compared to Ash Wednesday. Just imagine, if we had four extra hours of God in our lives each day. This isn't about doing more stuff ourselves, but allowing God to do more through us. Recognising God at work in our attitudes, what we take notice of in the world, how we respond to situations and our interactions with others will all increase the amount of his light that shines in your life.

Confirmation at St Mary's

On Sunday 3 February nine candidates from the Croydon Addington Deanery were confirmed by Bishop Jonathan at St Mary of Nazareth Church. This was truly a multi-generational event: the youngest candidate's son of one year old was there and the oldest candidate, Joyce Town, was 98 years older than him!

Joyce is a member of St Francis' and since the service there has been a great deal of publicity around having a 99-year-old confirmation candidate. This has been a great encouragement and confirms that it's never too late to do anything in life.

There were some aspects of the confirmation that were adapted for Joyce: her preparation was more a reflection on her past life and faith journey and her seating arrangements were determined so as to make the walk to the font for her reminder of baptism and to the altar for her confirmation as short and easily accessible as possible.

The whole of this experience has shown how a positive attitude of mind and a bit of flexibility can enable God's revelation to be brought into a situation. Joyce had not considered confirmation before because it was something for younger people and the preparation required would have been too time-consuming. Neither of these factors were seen as barriers when finally she accepted God's call for her to express her faith in this way. The witness that has been given to others about always taking that next step of faith whatever your age, is a powerful message. It has also served to tell others outside church about what's possible when God is involved in your life.

An Update from Zimbabwe

During February, Hazel and I had the pleasure of meeting the new Bishop of Central Zimbabwe, Bishop Ignatius Makumbe, whom many of you will know was the parish priest for St Andrew's in Gweru, our link parish. He was in this country to attend the annual training for new bishops in the world-wide Anglican Church held in Canterbury. Following this he stayed for a few days with Bishop Jonathan, the Bishop of Croydon.

Whilst here, Bishop Ignatius shared with us the situation in Zimbabwe, which he described, borrowing his image from the Book of Exodus, as a burning bush, adding, "But we are not consumed." He also told us that the mainstream churches in Zimbabwe, which in addition to the Anglicans, includes the Catholics, Methodists and Baptists, have come together to challenge the corruption and incompetence which afflicts the Government. As a consequence the leaders of these churches are putting their lives on the line in following what they see as their Christian duty.

Bishop Ignatius also shared with us what he would like us to focus on when praying for our Christian brothers and sisters in his diocese.

First there is education. There are nine church schools in the diocese, seven of which are primaries in rural areas and all need major renovation to improve the teaching and learning environment. There is one secondary school, St Patrick's, and one urban primary in Kwekwe. These two are the only ones in a fairly reasonable state.

Then there is health, where the focus is on St Patrick's Hospital, currently under construction, with the installation of plumbing underway, including the fitting of septic tanks. A considerable quantity of hospital equipment is now in place, which it is hoped will enable the hospital to open some sections to the public in the first quarter of this year. However, there is a still much work to be done on the male, female and maternity wards.

Because of the levels of deprivation in the diocese, it is not possible for tithes and offerings to meet the financial demands on the diocese.

Consequently, the diocese is investing in three major projects, the first of which is to establish a gold processing plant. Land and some of the processing equipment have already been acquired. However, this is a capital intensive project, requiring much support. The second project is the development of a dairy herd at Patrick's Farm. Again this is in need of capital support. Finally, there are plans to construct an upmarket secondary school in the urban area, which will provide quality education and employment, and income for the diocese.

The fourth area for prayer is the church's infrastructure. There is an ongoing programme of roofing rural rectories and churches throughout the diocese, with the aim of creating worthy places of worship and decent accommodation for the clergy and their families.

Bishop Ignatius expressed his gratitude for the funds which the Croydon-Zimbabwe link has already donated and which will go a long way towards meeting these areas of need, but added that there is a need for still more resources to complete the tasks. He hoped that the projects outlined above would inspire people to support the Bishop of Southwark's Lent Appeal (for further information, see the project sheets in church, or on-line at http://southwark.anglican.org/lentcall/resources.) As we sometimes hear at our 8 a.m. Communion services: "How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?" (I John 3. 17) And one would add, inspire us also to pray for our Christian brothers and sisters in Zimbabwe, especially for the protection of the Bishop and other church leaders as they work for justice in that country and for the growth of God's Kingdom here on earth.

A tiny homemade cake or savoury would lift the spirits. The food here is not bad but it lacks variety.

Could anyone make time, even just once a month, for a phone call, a visit two or maybe three times a year? It would make us feel we were still part of the real world again.

The neighbourliness of my childhood seems a thing of the past. Perhaps by revisiting it, the church might live again. I send thoughts and prayers.

Bishop Jonathan writes . . .

As you read this, we will (probably) be on the verge of the UK's exit from the EU. Whatever you think about this issue, it is clear that that probable fracture has meant that many others have become more obvious – between the nations of the UK and within them, in increased race and hate crime, in uncertainty and anxiety for those many nationals of other EU countries living here, as well as our friends and families who live in other parts of the EU. It has exposed deep differences of view about our country and its nature and its future, with accusations of bad faith and even treachery becoming commonplace.

Whatever may happen next, there is real potential for a further fracturing of relationships. Against that, we must remember that it has been the task of the Church throughout the ages to make peace – a job which in this country we have been able to leave mostly to the State for as long as any of us can remember. Now it is again front and centre in our mission. The Archbishop of Canterbury put it this way in a debate in Parliament: "I hold firm to the belief that we can create a society where mutual flourishing is possible, disagreeing well is central and respect for difference is paramount . . . Reconciliation happens from the top of society down, from the bottom of society up and from the middle of society out. It must include women, youth and minorities. If any group is left out, peace is not sustainable".

Our Zimbabwean brothers and sisters, in far more trying times, are a great example to us of what it means to truly seek God's kingdom and not to live with our minds set on earthly things (Matthew 16:23). The churches in Zimbabwe, working together ecumenically, are a powerful voice in that country, calling for reconciliation between political opponents, for justice and for peace. At a national and at a local level and in our own lives we share that same calling, and the promise of Jesus, "Blessed are the peacemakers".

We go out as peacemakers not because we have everything right, but because we have a peace which passes human understanding. Within the church we have our own disagreements and conflicts, at every +Jonathan Croydon


