Dear Friends

As I sit down to write this, we have only just celebrated the Feast of the Epiphany, otherwise known as the Manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles, a festival that celebrates the fact that although Jesus was born a Jew and although it is the Jewish scriptures that look forward to the coming of a Messiah, it was God's plan from the beginning that Jesus was to be the world's Messiah, a point emphasised at the end of Matthew's Gospel, with Jesus' instruction to his disciples that they are to make disciples of all nations, and the reason why you are reading this today, when a third of the world is already Christian and the numbers in places like Korea and China are growing daily.

Christmas and Epiphany occur, in the words of Christina Rossetti's carol, in the bleak midwinter, but soon it will be spring, the Old English word for which is 'lent,' a word which has become the name which we give to the time in the Church's year when traditionally we undertake a period of self-examination and reflection in preparation for the greatest festival in the Church's year, Easter.

Again, traditionally, it has become the custom to 'give something up for Lent,' more often than not something which is not good for our health. Good as this might be, it isn't really what Lent is all about. Rather, Lent is about spiritual discipline, about doing something that will help our spiritual growth, such as spending more time in prayer or reading the Bible or joining a home group. Or doing all three by participating in one of our groups following the Lent course.

This year's Lent course is based on the 2008 BBC serialisation of 'The Passion,' which was broadcast during that year's Holy Week. Opening with the Jesus and his disciples on their way to celebrate Passover, it dramatises the events of that momentous week in world history, culminating in the Resurrection, with a cast including Joseph Mawle, James Nesbitt and Penelope Wilton.

Using the film, the whole of which we will see as part of the course, we shall look at the significance of the events of Holy Week, including the part played by Judas, and the reality of what our salvation cost Jesus.

Then on Passion Sunday, March 29th, at the joint service, we shall be having a dramatised reading of the Passion, which will complement admirably what we shall be doing on the Lent course. So do think seriously and prayerfully about giving up around two hours a week for the six weeks that lead up to Easter. And you can also give up chocolate if you really think that's necessary!

Bishop Christopher writes

I have just returned from my annual pre-Advent retreat and I have been reflecting on the past year and preparing for Advent and Christmastide when we welcome the Christ child again. In the last few days it has turned cold and I could not help but reflect that many will find this time of year especially hard because of that. I am sure that, like me, you have noticed that there seem to be more street homeless now than there were a year ago. As I walk down Borough High Street from the Cathedral towards Trinity House, the Diocesan Offices, I am aware that there are many people whom I see day after day and it is partly for this reason that, once again, I will be joining the large numbers of people sleeping out at the Cathedral as part of the annual fundraising drive for the Robes Project.

Robes provides a meal and a bed as well as other services for the homeless in churches of different denominations in the Boroughs of Lambeth and Southwark during the winter months. I am Patron of Robes and support them and Glass Door and other work with the homeless throughout our Diocese. The work that our churches do to help those in need is truly impressive and I want to thank all who share in this good work. Advent is a time for us to renew hope as we recall what we each have, giving thanks to God for his many gifts to us. In the coming weeks I hope that you will want to spend time considering the Holy Scriptures prayerfully as you prepare once again to welcome the Christ child into our world.

There are many things which are uncertain as I write: we do not know the outcome of the General Election or if, and when, Brexit will happen. Our society can feel increasingly fragmented and it is those who live on the margins of our society who often suffer the most. As you look forward to Christmas and think about how you will spend it with friends

and family, please think about those whom you know who may not have others with whom to spend Christmas. So many, like the Holy Family, find that they do not have somewhere to stay or people to be with and I hope that, like the innkeeper, you will want to welcome the stranger at this Christmas time.

May I wish you and your families a blessed Advent and a holy and joyful Christmas.



Mothering Sunday and Lent - Background Information

Mothering Sunday

The Church of England keeps Mothering Sunday on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. The origins of Mothering Sunday were almost certainly pre-Christian. Both the Ancient Greeks and the Romans had a spring festival to celebrate motherhood: The Romans kept the feast of Matronalia, while the Greeks honoured Cybele (the mother of the gods) on the Ides (15) of March. When Christianity was established in Britain, the focus became a celebration of the Mother Church.

Some time after the Norman Conquest, there grew up a practice of daughter churches visiting the Mother Church of the Diocese on a particular Sunday in Lent, probably for the purpose of presenting an offering at the altar.

The fourth Sunday of Lent (sometimes called Laetare or Refreshment Sunday), was allowed as a day of respite from the Lenten fast – this forms another piece in the jigsaw behind the modern observance of Mothering Sunday e.g. the tradition of eating of Simnel cake in some parts of the country.

A popular notion is that Mothering Sunday was an occasion when, in the 18th and 19th centuries, domestic servants were given the day off to visit their mothers and the family home. What is far more likely is that the gathering of families on Mothering Sunday was due to the older custom of going together to the Mother Church.

Today Mothering Sunday is a special service when children and families are invited to church to bless gifts and give thanks for and to those who care for us and the Mother Church.



<u>Lent</u>

Lent is the forty-day-long liturgical season of fasting and prayer before Easter, beginning on Ash Wednesday and ending on Holy Saturday. The forty days represent the time Jesus spent in the desert, where according to the Bible he endured temptation by Satan.

The purpose of Lent is to prepare, through prayer, penitence, almsgiving and self-denial, for the annual commemoration during Holy Week of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus, which recalls the events linked to the Passion.

The six Sundays in Lent are not counted among the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter", a celebration of Jesus' victory over sin and death.
