#### **Prayer Cycle**

We pray for those who live on:

Boleyn Gardens; Braemar Gardens; Bramley Way; Cavendish Way; Chamberlain Crescent; Chatsworth Lodge, 2 Wickham Court Road; Chessington Way; Christie House; Dixon Place.

In our cycle of prayer for other churches in West Wickham, we pray for the people at Hawes Lane Methodist Church and West Wickham and Shirley Baptist Church.

We pray for the current coronavirus situation and for all who mourn the loss of someone who has died as a result of contracting the disease. Give wisdom to policymakers, skill to healthcare professionals and researchers, comfort to everyone in distress and a sense of calm to us all in these days of uncertainty.

We pray for each of the projects that are supported by the Bishop's Lent Appeal:

- L'Arche community in Bethlehem, which brings together core members with learning disabilities and assistants to engage in creative activity and share daily life, so providing employment for those with learning difficulties and making the local community aware of the value and worth of those with learning disabilities;
- Kaduna Centre for the Study of Christian-Muslim Relations, northern Nigeria, where those involved in conflict prevention and resolution are taught the religious beliefs of both their own and the 'other' religions, so that Kaduna State can become a place of safety and peace and an example for the other flash-point states in the north of Nigeria;
- SparkFish in the Redhill area, which supports local schools with an aim of encouraging and inspiring young people in faith, hope and love;
- Nicholas Stewart Project in Earlsfield, which raises awareness of the effects of youth violence and runs a mentoring programme for vulnerable primary school pupils;
- Superkidz in Eltham, which serves communities that are among the
  most deprived in the country, tackling drug abuse and drug dealing by
  valuing children and teaching them perseverance, social responsibility
  and rejection of gangs, so breaking the cycle of damaged children
  becoming struggling or damaging parents;
- For projects in Zimbabwe which are tackling food insecurity, training
  priests to lead work that helps to meet the many needs of people, and
  helping in those areas devastated by Cyclone Idai to build houses,
  develop market gardens and give educational opportunities.

# Keep Calm and Carry on Hand-Washing!

At the time of writing, the biggest news topic is the rapid spread of the coronavirus showing how connected we all are. Events which started off half a world away and seemed very remote are now very close to home, as travel overseas is so easy and commonly done.

The 17th century poet and priest, John Donne, famously wrote: 'No man is an island'. This current outbreak reminds us that our common humanity connects us with everyone else in the world, irrespective of national borders, economic or social status, or anything else that usually divides us. For the church, I am reminded of how St Paul describes us as 'the body of Christ' - one body, made of many parts, or members. He says, 'If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it' (1 Cor. 12.26). The same could be said of our world: if part of it suffers, we are all affected. But let's not fear unnecessarily, as we have something that can overcome fear – St John wrote in his letter, 'perfect love casts out fear' (1 John 4:18). So, let's be sensible and take the public health advice offered (with due regard to our own vulnerabilities), but without becoming unduly anxious. If all the church uses that perfect love that we find in Christ to make a difference in our approach to the real life issue of coronavirus, we will all play a part in seeking the health and wellbeing of everyone. The Bishop of St Albans has suggested that there are four things that we can do as Christians to make a real difference:

- **1.** Think about how we can protect and support our neighbours. So many people today do not know their neighbours. What if this crisis showed us the downside of valuing our virtual and social-media neighbours, rather than our physical neighbours?
- **2.** Think about who may be suffering more than you. There is great value in looking out for others that we know who are elderly, housebound or who have chronic health conditions. They may be very anxious. All it needs is a telephone call.
- **3**. Don't give into panic and start hoarding food. There is plenty to go around, so practise the Christian discipline of sharing, so speaking of God's generosity.

**4**. Live today to the full. None of us ever know what the future holds. In the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 6, 25–34), Jesus challenged his followers to live each day fully and not to worry. Every time we are tempted to give in to fear and worry, we need to make a conscious choice to respond in trust and openness.

If others in the population see this kind of behaviour in us and then hear the message of Easter, think what a difference it might make. Never has Christ's offer of love, truth, care, strength and light been so relevant to our world today. Our choice is to either follow the ways of this world, allowing fear to take charge, or we can turn to Christ and trust in God's grace, which is brought to bear in all our loving and caring acts.

# **Bishop Richard writes...**

At the beginning of February we remember the Presentation of Christ in the Temple forty days after his birth, as told in the marvellous story in Luke 2. This can be seen as a kind of pivot point between Christmas and Easter as we turn from the birth of Christ and the message of the incarnation that God is with us, to the story of Christ's death and resurrection in Holy week and Easter, which reveals the purpose and the effect of God's saving and sacrificial love in our midst. The Presentation of Christ gives us a glimpse of the great truths of both Christmas and Easter, and helps us to see the whole picture of the purpose of our lives as Christians, and what is truly important in the Christian faith in the life of the Church and the world. As the elderly Simeon holds the infant Christ in his arms, he declares that his eyes have seen God's salvation that will bring light to all nations. In a heart-breaking phrase he expresses the costliness of sacrificial love as he tells Mary that a sword will pierce her own soul too.

The path to salvation via the way of God's self giving love in Christ is a deeply costly one, but it is the way that brings true fullness of life and healing in every situation. Central to Christian life is being shaped by God's sacrificial love in Christ. The end of February sees Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. Central to that season, and to Christian faith, is the call to repentance — to re-orientate our lives away from sin and selfishness and towards love of God and neighbour. This entails careful and prayerful examination of our lives both individually and corporately.

The Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book for 2020 is entitled "Saying yes to life", written by Dr Ruth Valerio from TEAR fund. It offers thought-provoking reflections, questions and prayers for both individuals and groups. She draws imaginatively on the days of creation from Genesis 1 to help us think about our Christian response to matters of environmental, ethical and social concern. In his foreword, Archbishop Justin says, "every single one of us has a responsibility as part of our discipleship to Jesus Christ to live a life that cares for God's world and its creatures . . . sadly, Christians have not

always given God's creation reverence it deserves . . . it is of the utmost importance that we now stand in solidarity together, repenting of our sins towards our Earth and committing to face our responsibilities as God's people . . . to live out the life that Christ calls us to live, to care for our neighbours, for the creatures and the creation that God has so generously given us."

2020 will be a significant year in our response to the climate and environmental issues which have reached such a critical stage in the life of our planet. This will be a major theme at the Lambeth Conference of bishops of the Anglican Communion in July, and in the autumn the city of Glasgow will host a major and extremely important international conference. It is vital that we think deeply about our Christian response at every level – individually how we live our lives, as a Church with our commitments to Eco-Church and Eco-Diocese, and nationally and internationally. I hope and pray that in this time between the Presentation of Christ and the beginning of Lent we may be able to give deep thought and action as to what we might do in response to the salvation of God in Christ which brings light to all the nations.




