# Joseph reflects on the Birth of Jesus

# The beginning in Nazareth

Welcome to my humble carpenter's workshop in Nazareth. My name's Joseph, my wife is Mary and our very special young son is Jesus. We've been away from Nazareth for a long time and we're not long back, so I'm building up the trade once again. The story of our life together as a young family is quite mind boggling – so many things have happened – dreams, finding somewhere where Mary could give birth, visitors to see our son – some from very distant lands - long journeys and living in a foreign land to escape the brutal Herod. Let me tell you a little about it all. I'm sure that you'll be amazed too – and maybe, like me, you'll think about what it all means. You never know the whole thing may change your life – just as it has changed Mary and me.

My life changed when I met Mary. She really was a beautiful young girl. We had so much in common – the same values, the same dream and even the same sense of humour. It was inevitable we would get engaged. All was going well – we were both so looking forward to our wedding day and setting up home together. Then everything changed. Mary told me she was pregnant. I was so angry – the father must have been someone else in the village. What a disgrace – the village gossips had a field day. Mary tried to tell me that an angel from God had visited her and that her child would be his son. Like I would believe that!! She said that the angel had told her that the child was the promised Messiah – that he was to be the Son of God. She seemed so calm and peaceful about it all – unlike me. To say I was seething would be the understatement of the year. I didn't know what to do or where to turn.

But then I had a dream – God's messenger spoke to me. It was no daydream – this was for real. I'd always tried to do what's right in life – obey all the religious rules and festivals – but God speaking direct to me? I was told that Mary's baby really was God's son. I was even given his name – Jesus – and that I was not to be afraid to marry Mary. It was such a vivid dream – so real – how could I ignore it? The most amazing thing was that after the dream, my anger melted away and I felt a complete peace that I had never experienced before. It was as if me saying 'yes' to the angel was the turning point. Saying 'yes' was the start of this amazing new life that Mary and I shared together.

I've been making little reminders for Mary of our experiences so far. The angel was the start so this little wooden model will be take pride of place in our home. It'll remind us of how we both said 'yes' to God, how 'yes' brought us a marvellous inner peace and how in saying 'yes' our lives were changed forever.



#### The birth in Bethlehem

So, we got married. Not a big wedding – just a quiet ceremony. Mary rushed off to see her cousin Elizabeth who was also expecting a baby – if you ask me that's another miracle considering how old Elizabeth was. My carpenters work was doing fine and all was well until just before Mary was due to give birth, the Romans decided on a tax census. They decreed that everyone had to go back to their hometown to be counted so that they weren't losing any money in their coffers. Now, my hometown is a small place called Bethlehem. It's way down south of the country – not far from Jerusalem. We had no



choice but to undertake this long, hard journey made even more difficult because Mary was so near to birth. However, I still found this inner peace I mentioned earlier and I was sure God was protecting us. I made this little portrait of Mary, me and our trusty donkey to remind us of the long days and nights of our journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

Fortunately, we managed to get to Bethlehem safely although Mary must have been really uncomfortable by the time we arrived. Bethlehem was bustling with people – not just those who lived there, but hundreds who had travelled from all points of the compass for the census and many Roman soldiers as well. By the time we entered the town, it was clear that there was no proper accommodation to be found – not even in the homes of my relatives or people I knew. The inns were full to the rafters and, anyway, who wants to give birth in a noisy, rowdy pub? Eventually, we found a space in a house where the animals were housed – most houses in Bethlehem had animals and stables to keep them.

It was there in this dirty, smelly stable that Mary gave birth. It could have been stressful, but once again, we both had this most amazing peace – the peace brought by the angel back in Nazareth. We found some rags and wrapped our new son in them. No luxurious bed or cot of course, so we just laid him on the straw used to feed the animals. Not a very auspicious start to life for the Son of God and yet it seemed to be the right place for him to

sleep and for us to wonder at the gift of this new life. God was there with us in love and peace right there amongst the animals and the fodder. He wasn't watching from a distance, he had come to us in Nazareth, walked with us to Bethlehem and rejoiced with us as we watched our baby son sleeping on the straw. God's love was there in that stable. Mary and I knew that comfort, peace and joy that was God's gift to us.

### Visitors come to see us

We weren't on our own in that stable for very long. We could have done with a rest after our long journey and the ordeal of the birth. Yet not long afterwards some rough men who had been looking after sheep in the fields just outside Bethlehem rushed in completely out of breath. I wondered how on earth they knew about Mary and I and Jesus. They told us of another encounter with angels. These angels get about a bit don't they! Apparently, these shepherds were minding their own business watching over their flock making sure that their sheep weren't attacked by wolves or the stray town dogs. Suddenly, an angel appeared to them (shades of Nazareth nine months ago!!) and the normally pitch darkness was flooded with marvellous light. Understandably, the men were absolutely terrified. What on earth was going on? The angel told them not to be afraid and told them about the birth of our son who really was the Messiah and they could find him here in this stable wrapped up in rags. Then, not one angel, but hundreds of them appeared and sang praise to God. They said that there would be peace on earth among those God loved.

They felt compelled to get to our stable as fast as they could – no wonder they were breathless. They brought a couple of young lambs with them as they couldn't leave them to fend for themselves in the dark fields. When these men saw Jesus they just stared at him with wonder and awe. The shepherds told us how they experienced that peace that Mary and I found through the angels. What is it about angels and peace?

I wondered why the angels appeared to these shepherds. Why did God reveal himself to them? They were the lowest of the low – the local outcasts. Did you know that they were considered to be completely unreliable witnesses. They weren't allowed to give any evidence in a court case – uneducated and unreliable. Is this how God chooses to reveal himself – to outcasts and the lowly? Is this who our little Jesus was sent to love and to heal? You would think that God would have sent his angels to announce the birth of his son to the High Priests or the great rabbis and teachers of the law – but no, he sent his angels to lowly, unreliable people – those who other people looked down on. Mind you, some posh people did turn up not too long afterwards. I mean Jesus is the Son of God, so why not receive expensive gifts from the rich and famous. I have to tell you that those

angels appeared to the posh people as well - but that's just another story for another time.



I made this little scene of Mary and I with a shepherd and a couple of sheep in Bethlehem to remind Mary and I of those men who, like us, had found peace, love and joy through the angels. The lowly, unreliable and outcasts drawn to the Son of God.

I wonder if that's going to be the path that Jesus' life

takes in the future?

# **Prayer pointers**

Thank God for the peace and joy that is found in the manger in Bethlehem. For the way that Mary and Joseph both said 'yes' to God even though what they were asked to do seemed impossible. Pray that we may not be afraid to say 'yes' when God calls us to witness to Him and to serve in His name.

God announced the birth of Jesus to humble, lowly, unreliable shepherds. Pray for all those who society looks down on – the homeless, refugees and all those who don't fit in. Thank God for all who will serve them over the Christmas and New year period – especially for all the soup kitchens on the streets of our city and for the volunteers who give up their festive season to feed and clothe the vulnerable. May we support them in our service and in our giving.

Pray for all who will be unable to see their loved ones over the festive period due to the Coronavirus restrictions, especially those who live on their own. May everyone still find real joy and peace – the peace that passes all understanding – the peace that all who met the Christ-child found. Pray especially for all in our local care homes – the residents and the staff.

As we remember how God was close to Mary and Joseph during the difficult journey they made from Nazareth to Bethlehem, thank God for the way in which he has remained close to us in this most difficult year of 2020. For the way in which St Mary's and St Francis' have maintained worship and pastoral care for the congregations. Pray that God will continue to strengthen and support us all as we go into the New Year and that we may respond to His call to serve and care for our community.

Pray for all those who are ill and for those who have had surgery or treatment recently – especially for Valerie Hamilton and Sam Hand. Hold before God all those in the NHS who will be working in our hospitals and ambulances over Christmas and New Year. Continue to pray for all those working on the Covid wards and for those who are feeling stressed and struggling to cope with the difficult cases.

# First Reading: Isaiah 61:10-62:3

<sup>10</sup> I will greatly rejoice in the LORD, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. <sup>11</sup> For as the earth brings forth its shoots and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

# **Gospel: Luke 2:15-21**

<sup>15</sup> When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' <sup>16</sup> So they went with

haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. <sup>17</sup> When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; 18 and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. <sup>19</sup> But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. <sup>20</sup> The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them. <sup>21</sup> After eight days had passed, it was time to circumcise the child; and he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb.

# First Reading: Ephesians 3: 1-12

3 This is the reason that I Paul am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles—<sup>2</sup> for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given to me for you, <sup>3</sup> and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, <sup>4</sup> a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. 5 In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: 6 that is, the Gentiles have become fellowheirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel. Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given to me by the working of his power. 8 Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the

### Gospel: Matthew 2: 1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, <sup>2</sup> asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' 3 When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; <sup>4</sup> and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. 5 They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:6 "And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a

ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."' <sup>7</sup>Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. 8 Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' 9 When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. <sup>10</sup> When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. 11 On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasurechests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. 12 And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.
