Hazel writes:

Last week was an important step in learning to live with Covid. Although some of us tested positive recently, it did not stop our ministry and we are now well on our way to complete recovery. This has reminded us of the need to be flexible in the way we operate, so as to keep others safe.

Clearly the message about the virus easily spreading is correct. No-one should feel obliged to come to an event in person, even if you are due to be volunteering. It is OK to say 'no' and we will continue with our on-line provision, telephone contact and paper-based communications to keep our community together. This will not stop because restrictions are lifted. If you are coming to an event where many people are likely to be present, please do be mindful of others and consider taking a lateral flow test beforehand, as well as wearing a face mask while you are inside our buildings.

Today, we have Holy Communion services at 8am and 9.15am in St. Mary's Church and at 10.45am in St Francis' Church.

First Reading: Revelation 19: 6-10

⁶Then I heard what seemed to be the voice of a great multitude, like the sound of many waters and like the sound of mighty thunderpeals, crying out, 'Hallelujah! For the Lord our God the Almighty reigns.

⁷Let us rejoice and exult and give him the glory, for the marriage of the Lamb has come, and his bride has made herself ready;

⁸ to her it has been granted to be clothed with fine linen, bright and pure' for the fine linen is the righteous deeds of the saints. ⁹ And the angel said to me, 'Write this: Blessed are those who are invited to the marriage supper of the Lamb.' And he said to me, 'These are true words of God.' ¹⁰ Then I fell down at his feet to worship him, but he said to me, 'You must not do that! I am a fellow-servant with you and your comrades who hold the testimony of Jesus. Worship God! For the testimony of Jesus is the spirit of prophecy.'

Gospel Reading: John 2: 1-11

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. ² Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. ³ When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' ⁴ And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' ⁵ His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' 6 Now standing there were six stone waterjars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. ⁷ Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim.

⁸ He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. 9 When the steward tasted the water that had become wine and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom ¹⁰ and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' 11 Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

REFLECTION – Ken Bryan

What a lovely start to a new year. A reading about a wedding. And no ordinary wedding at that, because it was a wedding that Jesus had been invited to. We don't know if it was a relation, or a friend of the family, or just close friends from the town or village of Cana. But what we are sure of is that Jesus was there. And this was to be a very auspicious time not just for the marrying couple but for Jesus whose ministry was about to begin in earnest. He had just called his new disciples to come and follow him and all together they went to join the wedding celebrations.

For the newly married couple it will be a time of change as they come to work out their new relationship with each other and with the outside world.

And for us entering a new year it is a time of change as we wonder how this year will be different from the last.

And especially as we are in a changing situation with regards to the pandemic. It is evolving and we are discovering ways to fight it with science and with our actions.

Each of these brings its own uncertainties.

What will the new normal look like for the newly married couple? What will the new normal look like for us in 2022 socially, politically and economically? And what restrictions to our lives will we be enduring because of the pandemic? Will we make the most of what we can do after nearly two years of restrictions?

Change is a constant in our lives with the ups and downs of life as well as the ebbs and flows of our lives of faith. We might not be sure what tomorrow will bring but we hope for the best. Just as the newly married couple will hope for the best and work together for a better life.

And in this time of increased uncertainty, it is good to realise that we can't lock ourselves away, even if we are indoors for a lot of the time, but we can and must keep active and keep in touch with others and keep in touch with God.

Our reading is a big change in the life of Jesus.

With this first miracle Jesus' life changed for good. He then relied totally on his relationship with his father. God guided him through some good times but also many challenging times and towards the most daunting and challenging time of all at his

arrest, trial, beating and crucifixion. Which of course we know had to happen for there to be that glorious moment of his resurrection and the new life for all who followed him then and down the centuries to us now.

What a celebration a wedding can be. And in first century Jewish times and in many places round the world today people come from far and wide to join in the celebrations and the festivities can go on for several days. Lots will be eaten, and lots will be drunk.

A foretaste of the great heavenly feast. This event points to that time. The water jars used for Jewish purification rites are a sign that God is doing a new thing from within the Jewish system bringing purification in a whole new way.

When the water is turned into wine it can signify the water of the Jewish faith being turned into the new wine of all who follow him to become the new Christians. And this is for all people.

For there to be six jars is also a sign. Six being an imperfect number according to the Jews, so these jars represent imperfection but when filled by Jesus they are not only filled with the finest wine but there is so much more to go round than anyone could possibly need.

John began with the words 'on the third day' and for him that is significant as his whole gospel points through signs to Jesus as the Messiah. So, this could well be John signifying the beginning of Jesus' ministry on earth which culminated with the three days in the grave after his crucifixion and before his resurrection to a new life?

Baptism is another time of change and last week Hazel asked us to renew our baptismal vows and have some time reflecting on how we have received the light of Christ, signifying the love of God, and how we might commit to turn to God during the coming year, trusting in his promise to be with us and to affirm his love for us. Some of us lit a candle which we were encouraged to relight in a quiet moment to recognise that God has called us by name, and we are his. And to reflect on what this tells us about how God values and loves us. I wonder if we have done that this week or will do it in the coming week?

Jesus can do new things in our lives if we let him. If he can turn six stone jars full of water into the finest of wines, what can he do for us and with us? Turn us into fine human beings to do his father's will. And for his church to be a reflection of his

goodness. And as it says in Revelation: blessed are those invited to the marriage supper of the lamb. And the saints will do righteous deeds.

Jesus can do the unexpected if we just let him.

How can we be open to listen to Jesus? By prayer, reading the scriptures and seeking guidance for what it is saying to us. And even listening to friends and those we meet as they may be giving us some wisdom from God even if they may not realise it themselves. Don't just accept everything you hear so do test out what you think is being said to you but don't ignore the promptings from God. You may be surprised at the generosity of God in showing his love to you. In good and bad times.

I don't say this flippantly as I realise many people are going through very difficult and even tragic times. But offer yourself to God and seek his love for you which is immense.

I do like the Revelation reading that talks of a great multitude crying out 'Hallelujah. For the Lord our God, the Almighty reigns.' Not just one or two people feeling they are on their own and probably a little shy about speaking out, but a great multitude giving each other confidence. Are we among the many as promised and are we feeling confident enough to shout, not whisper or just speak but to shout 'Hallelujah'?

Finally, Mary is here at the beginning of Jesus' ministry and the only other time we see her in this gospel is at the foot of the cross. What changes she has endured in her life.

There is a richness of life on offer that we can only imagine. It is sheer gift and requires only our co-operation. If we listen to Mary's message 'to do whatever Jesus tells us' we will find the strength to proclaim his wonders. We will be empowered by God's Holy Spirit to begin to change the sadness in our lives and the injustice in our world so that we can truly celebrate and cry out with joy, 'Hallelujah our God reigns.'
