**Morning Prayer** is at St Mary's Church on this Tuesday morning at 9am and then we are switching to Thursday mornings at 9am. It is also held in St Francis' Church on Wednesday mornings at 9.30am, followed by the church being **open for private prayer** from 10.30-11.30am.

**Coffee/tea & chat** is now held monthly and will be on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> September at 2.30 pm. This is an opportunity to share with others on-line. Resources and updates for the week ahead – This week our service will be livestreamed at 10am on YouTube. All other files for this week have been combined and posted as a pew sheet which has been sent on paper to those who have told us that they are not online. They are well-stocked with pasta, cereals and baked beans and please do not bring any fresh food, or baby milk as the foodbank cannot pass this on. Thanks to all those who have contributed stories about **'God with Us'** for the magazines and our special service in July. If you have any further stories to share, please do send them to Hazel (with a request for anonymisation if you'd prefer), so that we can continue to share these in different ways.

Messy Church introduced our new **Bug Hotel** at St Mary's. This is now in need of some furnishings – sticks and dry leaves - for the bugs to feel at home. If you want to walk with a purpose, please do collect some of these on your travels, bring them to St Mary's and put them into the Bug Hotel, or leave them beside it and someone from Messy Church will put them into the structure.

We are going to start a course, which will be a small group for those that might want a more spiritual approach to dealing with difficult things in life. This will be based on the **Alpha** material and will meet face to face starting in the middle of September. If you (or someone that you know) might benefit from sharing with others in a confidential setting and exploring faith further, please do be in touch with me. Hazel

Our **bereavement support bags** will be especially helpful in the months ahead. If you would like a bag to give to someone that you know who has lost a loved one, do take one from the back of either of the churches.

**Freedom from legal restrictions** have enabled us to make small changes in our public worship, but Covid 19 is still a threat. Please do come to one of the services to see how we are maintaining safety by observing the following:

- Keep your mask on, unless you are exempt or if you are leading the service in any way.
- Observe social distancing and only sit where there is a green tick, so maintaining at least 1m between people from different households.
- If, when you are sitting, you are concerned about others being too close to you, feel free to move to another seat.

One-way systems will remain in place. The sharing of the Peace will continue in a socially distanced format and arrangements for administering Communion, bread only, will remain the same for the time being.

Booking is open for the extremely popular **Bishop's Certificate Course** starting in September. There are five taught modules (5 weeks per module) and a final residential weekend module as follows:

- Following about the New Testament
- Remembering about the Old Testament
- Exploring about the history of the church and what it means to be Anglican
- Believing about what Christians believe
- Deepening about living, serving and praying as a follower of Jesus
- Expecting about putting your future into God's hands

For 2021/2022, there are four options to participate. Tuesday evenings at Trinity House, near London Bridge, Wednesday evenings online via 'Zoom', Thursday evenings online and Saturday mornings at Trinity House. The cost of the course is £220 which includes the residential event at Wychcroft. ## Feedback from congregation members

46 respondents: 19 from St Mary's, 27 from St Francis'

- Although 25 wanted the 10am service to continue, 42 will attend a 9.15am or 10.45am service on a Sunday. We will gradually explore how a transition back can be made possible.
- The other activities which people would like to continue are **pew sheets delivered by email/to the door** (40 respondents) and **regular Foodbank donation points** (30 respondents).
- Keeping in touch by phone and/or email is another activity people would like to see continued (25 respondents). Others include sermon and prayer pointers in the pew sheet (23 respondents) and church magazines being available online (24 respondents).
- The activities which have been missed the most are social activities (30 respondents) and community lunches (23 respondents). Others include home groups meeting in person (18 respondents), Saturday morning coffee at St Francis' (17 respondents) and Women's group meetings (15 respondents).

These are the activities that we will explore re-starting.

#### Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> August 2021

#### Collect

Almighty God, you search us and know us: may we rely on you in strength and rest on you in weakness, now and in all our days; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

#### First Reading: James 1: 17-27

<sup>17</sup> Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. <sup>18</sup> In fulfilment of his own purpose he gave us birth by the word of truth, so that we would become a kind of first fruits of his creatures.<sup>19</sup> You must understand this, my beloved, let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger; <sup>20</sup> for your anger does not produce God's righteousness. <sup>21</sup> Therefore rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness, and welcome with meekness the implanted word that has the power to save your souls. <sup>22</sup> But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. <sup>23</sup> For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; <sup>24</sup> for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. <sup>25</sup> But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act-they will be blessed in their doing.<sup>26</sup> If any think they are religious, and do not bridle their tongues but deceive their hearts, their religion is worthless. 27 Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world.

## Gospel Reading: Mark 7: 1-8. 14-15, 21-23

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, <sup>2</sup> they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them.<sup>3</sup> (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; <sup>4</sup> and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles. <sup>5</sup> So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?' <sup>6</sup>He said to them, 'Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written,

"This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me;<sup>7</sup> in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines."<sup>8</sup> You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition.'

<sup>14</sup> Then he called the crowd again and said to them, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand: <sup>15</sup> there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile.

<sup>21</sup> For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, <sup>22</sup> adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. <sup>23</sup> All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.'

#### **Post Communion Prayer**

God our creator, you feed your children with the true manna, the living bread from heaven: let this holy food sustain us through our earthly pilgrimage until we come to that place where hunger and thirst are no more; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

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## **Thirteenth Sunday after Trinity**

#### Collect

Creator God, whose Son Jesus Christ lived once in Palestine, yet whose arms flung wide on the cross, embrace all time and space in redeeming love, grant that we may use the earth's resources in a way that lasts throughout the earth for generations to come, by the power of the sustaining Spirit.

#### First Reading: Gen 9:8-17

<sup>8</sup>Then God said to Noah and to his sons with him, <sup>9</sup> 'As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, <sup>10</sup> and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. <sup>11</sup> I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth.'

<sup>12</sup> God said, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: <sup>13</sup> I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. <sup>14</sup> When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, <sup>15</sup> I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. <sup>16</sup> When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth.' <sup>17</sup> God said to Noah, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth.'

## Gospel Reading: Matthew 22:34-40

<sup>34</sup> When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, <sup>35</sup> and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. <sup>36</sup> 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' <sup>37</sup> He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." <sup>38</sup> This is the greatest and first commandment. <sup>39</sup> And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." <sup>40</sup> On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.'

#### **Post Communion Prayer**

God our creator, as we are refreshed by your word today and reminded that we are redeemed by the love of Christ in our communion, may we now find strength to sustain our planet as we journey on through life.

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#### Sermon – Ken Bryan

One consequence of the pandemic is that we have had our traditional Sunday worship totally disrupted for months. For a long while not even being allowed to enter our two church buildings. Our worshipping traditions have had to be halted and changed and even changed again. We might not have been happy with this situation but we have adapted and had to rethink what is most important to us in our faith. Is it us we serve or is it God that we serve?

In our gospel today Mark is probably writing this passage for Gentiles as the words in brackets explain things that would be known only to Jews.

The Pharisees and the scribes were not about to have their traditions changed, let alone not be observed. They were down from Jerusalem so were probably not only important people themselves but were going to report back to the highest authorities. They would have been watching everything that Jesus did and compiling a list of charges that they could bring against him.

The oral traditions of the elders that they were saying should be observed had been developed over the years to expand the meaning of scripture. All those people who were listening to this challenge would have been interested because it concerned how they lived their lives.

But what the Pharisees have been doing is raising these oral traditions to equal the words of scripture. They were changing or negating the purpose and spirit of God's law. They are so concerned about these traditions that they are missing the point, believing that they should go through life fulfilling all these rules of tradition without actually thinking about being committed in their hearts to the spiritual intention of the law. In effect their human teaching is superseding God's law.

What traditions do we live by that in reality are not red lines of behaviour but just what we have got used to? And we say must be done this way.

Yes certain things are socially acceptable like the clothes we wear and when we wear them. And how we behave in certain settings. But they are not the same for everyone and should not be used to drive us apart. In a family you would not expect boys and girls to dress exactly like their parents. Their hair styles would be different. Their eating habits may be different as some may be vegetarians or vegans. But they are still members of the same family and able to fulfil their part in family life.

Washing of hands has become a new tradition. Twenty seconds with soap and water. Not only for personal hygiene but also to help others by stopping the spread of the virus.

The wider community has different outlooks and values and habits. And our church family and local community to which we belong are full of people with different lifestyles.

What is important is what comes out of us in speech and actions which defines who we are and what we are and who we follow.

We could be fed good words or bad, helpful actions or selfish actions, but it is what we decide to do and say that defines us. We all have many conflicting influences in our lives. Which we sift and take on board or reject to make us into the people we want the world to see and what we feel God wants us to be.

Like food which goes into the body and passes through, so negative thoughts can enter our minds but can pass through and be rejected as paths that we do not wish to go down.

Jesus is showing them and us that inner attitudes are more important than outward standards.

In life we do look to traditions to guide us in our actions. In families, in communities, nationally and internationally. (Many outsiders believe every English man wears a bowler hat and carries an umbrella.) These join us together and can bring coherence and order. It is learned by observation and practice, sometimes taught, sometimes observed or assimilated. Both societal and religious.

It is a shame that the people who were criticising Jesus for an issue like the washing of hands before eating were missing the freedom that Jesus was bringing and the sick that were being cured, evil spirits cast out and sins forgiven.

These traditions, however must not get in the way of us. As it says in James be doers of the word and not merely hearers. To be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to anger.

This reminds me of a time many years ago when a group of us met and befriended an American, Michael, who was over here seeing the sights. He had the limitations of Cerebral Palsy so could hardly walk and his speech was very limited. It was difficult to understand him so he had a plastic wallet with an alphabet and numbers so that he could point and spell out a conversation. In fact he could tell a very good joke that way. He was accompanied by a carer who was ex US army by the name of Jim Pepper. As he had been a sergeant in the army he was the real Sergeant Pepper. Still that's another story. Michael was very intelligent and witty and was actually a TV script writer as he could get all his scripts written by typewriter, if very slowly.

It was when we were out with him that we could feel the looks that he was being given by those passing by who knew nothing about him. Some would look with concern, others with indifference but some showed actual distain, and would probably have ridiculed him if he was on his own.

This made us all realise that we should be slow to judge others who don't look like us. Surely this applies to so many situations that we might find ourselves in these days. We are called to care for orphans and widows and I am certain that includes people less fortunate than ourselves.

As we develop our vision for us here in our United Benefice let us seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

May we not let traditions get in the way of true worship. Worship from the heart.

After all worship is not just about sitting in church, praying or singing God's praise. Not to say that these things are wrong or not pleasing to God. We are after all beings who are called to praise God.

But it is about doing. Doing God's work here in this place and wherever we are.

Loving God and loving our neighbour.
