Hazel writes:

We had an excellent discussion on Thursday evening about mental health and well-being and how the church can help people in a distinctive way by bringing compassion through a listening ear. Mental health is not a topic to be afraid of, but one to be approached with the love of Jesus. *Perfect love casts out fear* (1 John 4:18)

Gospel Reading: John 15: 9-17

has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. ¹⁰ If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. 11 I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete. ¹² 'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. 13 No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. 14 You are my friends if you do what I command you. ¹⁵ I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know

what the master is doing; but I have called you friends because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. ¹⁶ You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. ¹⁷I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

Post Communion Prayer

God our Father, whose Son Jesus Christ gives the water of eternal life: may we thirst for you, the spring of life and source of goodness, through him who is alive and reigns, now and for ever.

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Sermon - United in Giving: Hazel O'Sullivan

In our gospel reading, Jesus calls his disciples, his friends. I wonder who are your friends? Maybe you have friends who you met at school that you're still in touch with, friends from work, friends that you've shared other things with. I wonder who you'd say is your closest friend? Is this the same kind of friend that Jesus was talking about?

When Jesus was talking about friendship, he was talking about a friendship where you don't get to choose whether you're a friend. It's not like on Facebook where you can ask someone to be a friend and they can 'confirm' or 'remove' you from their list of friends. No, Jesus gives his friendship to his disciples, and to us, as a gracious gift. And this means that Jesus has some surprising friends. The crowd in Jericho were surprised when Jesus went to eat at the house of Zaccheus, a tax collector: someone that they saw as a sinner and definitely not a friend to them. However, Jesus gives love and joy with his friendship and this is what binds him to his friends, whoever they are.

I think that Jesus' friendship has to be seen as a gift. A gift to be cherished rather than a prize to be pursued. It's not about anything that you've done to earn his friendship, but it's all about his love and joy. The former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, once commented that 'We are all on the receiving end of the same grace.' Being part of a Christian community, sharing together in Christian worship, is a great equaliser. Each one of us is chosen by God. We are all God's adopted children — beloved by him. And Jesus is a friend to us all - a friend who loves us and who laid down his life for us; a friend in whose company we can have joy. In the reading from Acts we see that the message of Jesus' love and friendship and the gift of the Holy Spirit is for everyone.

I wonder how this compares with those friendships which you thought about at the start. Are they marked out by love and joy? Would they lay down something of their life for you and vice versa?

So, what is it that you give to Jesus in response to his gift of love and friendship?

I want to look at four models, which have been influential in inspiring Christian giving in the past, before suggesting that we might need a new model for thinking about our giving.

The first model is the one that Jesus himself set when he asked a rich young man to sell all he had and follow him (Mark 10:17-23). The rich young man wasn't able to do this, and he grieved at the thought of not being able to have that gift of abundant eternal

life which Jesus offers. Many years later, someone who did follow this type of call and giving to Jesus was St Francis of Assisi and we obviously have a close connection to him which might mean that this model still has some appeal.

The second biblical model of giving comes after Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension, in Acts, Chapter 2, where we hear of Christian communities sharing everything that they had in common. This is where deep fellowship, worship and material goods and money are shared out, resulting in goodwill, encouragement and growth in the size of the community. This is the model followed by Benedictine and other monasteries.

Over the years the church has found these first two models of giving to Jesus rather too challenging to be implemented and sustained. I'm not suggesting that we adopt either of them, but it's interesting to consider the radical nature of the original biblical models for Christian giving. The third model of giving to look at is the one that the church in the UK was founded on. This is a benefactor model, where the local landowner funded the church. This meant that there wasn't the need for a commitment in time and effort, but, because the church was flourishing, the poor in the parish were looked after and the individuals who gave financially felt themselves to be close to God and they felt that they were promised a path to heaven for themselves and their loved ones.

As our historical structures of class and patronage have broken down, we've now moved primarily to a fourth model of giving - a stewardship model, where we, the local congregation, give our own time and money to the church in recognition of God's sacrificial love for us in Jesus, so that we can care effectively for human needs and grow our community.

As these four models have developed, sadly the link between our giving and the abundant life full of love and joy, which Jesus calls us into as a friend of his, has been lost. We see our giving as an exchange: we give in response to God's love in order to meet the costs of the church and to continue the activities that we want to run. We give our time, talent and money more out of duty than out of joy.

I'd like us to look at giving in a different way. In a way that mirrors more closely God's love for us. This gift of love isn't given out of duty. It's not seen as an exchange. No, it's a gift that's given freely with no expectation of what might come back in return. It's

given to benefit the recipient, not the giver. It's given to show something of what heaven is like and how relationships in that place can flourish.

Last week I talked about the vision of what being connected to Jesus and producing the fruit of an abundant life might look like – having authentic friendships, cultivating community assets and being a blessing for others. Giving to produce such fruit doesn't come with a guaranteed return. But it's <u>only</u> through giving to Jesus that we can gain those things that really matter and which money cannot buy – love, joy, peace, salvation. I urge you now at the end of our series, United in Giving, to come to Jesus. Come to Jesus, your friend who laid down his life for you, in prayer and make a commitment to give freely and generously. And that's in both time and money.

Practically this may mean going back over the other sermons in this series to remind you of what it is that we have to give thanks for, what it means to be generous, as God is generous and what our vision is for us to live lives connected to Jesus, our friend, and produce the fruit of an abundant life.

Practically this may also mean taking the United in Giving leaflet for the church that you feel a part of and following the advice on what you can do to increase the financial amount that you give and to make this contribution through the Parish Giving Scheme – a mechanism that will really help us to know that we can build up our mission to bring God's love to the people of West Wickham.

If you have any questions about the Parish Giving Scheme, do talk to our treasurers — David Wada and Bob West. If you have any ideas that you'd like to contribute to our vision, do talk to me. And I pray that through prayer and the commitments being made by you at this time we will be able to continue sharing God's love with others and introducing them to Jesus, our friend, who offers that abundant life full of love and joy.

Prayer Pointers

Pray for a closer sense of community in our congregation — that, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, our relationships with each other may deepen and that we may all truly care and watch out for each other. Pray that we may be radical disciples whose love and caring becomes a key feature of our church which attracts

more to join us on our journey with God. Pray that our love for each other and for our community may encourage people to become the next generation of worshippers at St Mary's and St Francis'.

Pray for all in leadership roles in the church especially for those who lead our Diocese of Southwark – for Bishop Christopher and the Area Bishops, and for all clergy and laity who lead parishes. In our own Deanery of Croydon Addington, pray for our Area Dean, Debbie Forman, and for God's blessing on the mission of all the churches in our Deanery. Pray especially for St John Selsdon as they prepare to welcome their new Rector – Younis Francis, and for St Francis', Monk's Hill as they reach out to their community with their 'Food Stop' project.

Pray for all who have felt that they are not fully welcomed in churches for reasons of sexuality, struggles with mental health or disability. Thank God for organisations such as 'Inclusive Church' who work to break down barriers and help churches to become places of welcome for everyone. Pray that we at St Mary's and St Francis' may be an open, welcoming and inclusive congregation reflecting the love of Christ for all.

Pray for our city of London and all who govern in the city and boroughs. Pray for the person elected to be the Mayor of London following the election on Thursday. Pray that our city may flourish once again following the Covid pandemic. Pray that society in London may be transformed, revived and healed by the grace of God and that we, as Christians connected with our community, may play our part in this healing through prayer and acts of love.

Pray for all those who are ill and for those who are having treatment or surgery at this time —especially for Michael Sanders and Julie Bailey. Pray for those we know, especially our relatives and friends, and those known to God alone, who seek God's healing grace. Pray especially for all those suffering from mental health issues and for those who care for them. Pray that those who are ill may find peace in their pain, strength in their weakness and comfort in their sadness.

Pray for those who have died and help us to trust they are at peace with you. We pray that we too may share with them the joy and light of the Kingdom of Heaven. Pray that we may trust God not for ourselves alone, but for those also whom we love and who are hidden from us by the shadow of death; that, as we believe your power to have raised our Lord Jesus Christ from the dead, so may we trust your love to give eternal life to all who believe in him.
