In this time of climate crisis may God grant us clarity to

- hear the groaning of creation and the cries of the poor;
- challenge us to change our lifestyles;
- guide our leaders to take courageous action;
- enable the church to be a beacon of hope; and
- foster within us a renewed vision of God's purposes for the world.

Dear Friends

In her poem “Hard Faith,” the poet Catherine Brennan imagines historians and archaeologists of the future assessing historical evidence from the high streets of today. From what they see, they conclude:

The shrines dominated the city, we think. Whole streets of temples competed for the adoration Of the devout. At certain times of the year pilgrims slept outside, waited to be the first to pay homage. We imagine it must have been auspicious for them to shiver through mid-winter’s nights. Appointed guardians performed seasonal rituals, garlanded altars with durable, unfading flowers.

She concluded this description of the January sales with a reference to the mannequins in the shop windows:

Observe their glossed perfection, eternally smooth skin, smiles painted indifferent to hope and suffering. They lack human proportions: are immaculate mannequins. They must be gods.

Of course these historians and archaeologists were wrong in their conclusions, weren’t they? Or were they?

As I write this, Marks and Spencer and John Lewis have just launched their Christmas TV advertisements with almost the same razzmatazz as a Hollywood blockbuster, and I see that Argos have just done the same.

And it wasn’t so long ago that, as a consequence of Covid, the media were concerned that the Prime Minister might have to cancel Christmas.

Sadly, it seems that each year Christmas becomes more detached from the religious festival that gives it its name and more the possession of big business, commerce and, if the Prime Minister really can cancel Christmas, politicians.

But I don’t think that that’s really the case. The event that we shall be celebrating on the 25th December, the birth of a baby who will change the world forever, still has a strong hold on the popular imagination – witness the number of schools that will be mounting nativity plays, the number of people who will be attending candlelit Carol Services, the increasing numbers of unaccompanied adults attending Christingle services. Something is drawing them to the manger to worship the Christ Child.

Our calling as Christians is to build on this, to make them aware that Christmas is only the beginning of the journey, that the child born in a backwater of the Roman Empire grows up to become the saviour of the whole world, so that according to The Centre for the Study of Global Christianity (CSGC) in America, the number of Christians in the world in 2019 edged past 2.5 billion from 2.3 billion in 2015 - that is in excess of 30% of the world’s population.

Numbers like this should give us the confidence to start claiming back Christmas from its secular “celebration” and proclaiming the real reason for the festival: Christmas begins with Christ, not with M&S, and He can be worshipped in the churches around the country.

I was talking to a senior leader in one of the Croydon schools today, and he told me that his recently widowed mother will be joining him and his wife for Christmas and she will be making sure that they all go to church on Christmas Day.

How about you? If you have people staying with you over Christmas or if you are going away, will you be inviting those with you to join you at church on Christmas morning? And will you, depending on your age, be sharing the real Christmas story with your children, grandchildren or great grandchildren. Christmas is just the time to share your faith with those around you.

God bless, have a great Christmas and enjoy the January sales – or not!

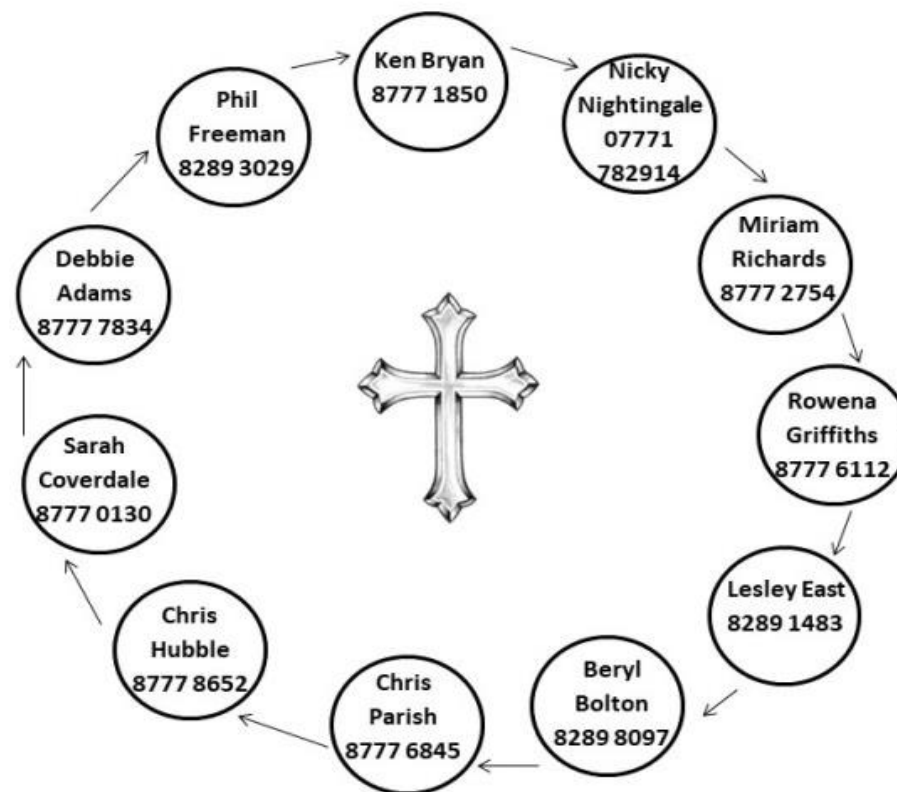
St Francis' & St Mary's Prayer Chain

Pilgrimage to Southwark Cathedral

The day dawned cool and bright as Hazel, Bo Polvsen and I set off at 7.40am from the Vicarage to walk to Southwark Cathedral where we would join others for a vigil for COP26. We were to follow a route that Hazel had planned out which would take in many green areas on the way. Firstly, a walk across Langley Park golf course and then through Kelsey Park passing the Kent Cricket ground in Worsley Bridge Road. At Southend Lane, we turned into Riverview Walk, which is a green space running alongside the railway line. It is a joy to walk along between the trees and along the banks of the River Pool, a tributary of the River Ravensbourne, in another world yet so close to railway and housing. We walked for a mile and a half where we stopped in Catford. It was here that Caroline took over from her husband Bo for the second half of our walk.

We walked up to see the impressive wide view of London from Blythe Hill before stopping at a lovely little café for a coffee. Then on refreshed to walk up One Tree Hill by St Augustine's Church. Another fine view of London at a place where Queen Elizabeth I was said to have picnicked beneath an oak a predecessor to the one we see today. It was not long before we were crossing Peckham Rye Park and Common then onto the bustling and diverse Peckham Rye. We were soon into the Surrey Canal Walk which had been a thriving canal in the 19th century and is now a green path. Glengall Wharf Garden with its large well used community garden led us into Burgess Park where we stopped for a break at the café for a wonderful bowl of homemade soup to sustain us.

We continued past the enormous Aylesbury Estate which is looking very tired and is slowly being replaced with smaller blocks of flats and houses with total regeneration for the whole area. Not far away we stopped to see a beautiful public space called Elephant Park Springs in the heart of the Elephant and Castle redevelopment. A few roads away we had to take a picture by the street sign for Pilgrimage Street. Through Borough Market and we were at Southwark Cathedral. It was 1.30pm and just time for a 19 quick drink in the Mudlark pub before joining many others in the Cathedral.

We were greeted by the sound of a choir singing songs from around the world. There were displays and prayerful activities that we could participate in before the Vigil service of hymns, readings and prayers all focussing on our fragile world and the forthcoming COP 26 conference. We returned by train with tired legs but having seen so much of South London that we hadn't seen before and with a hope that the world would do the right things at the conference to protect and save our world from the disastrous effects of climate change.

I must end by saying on behalf of Bo, Caroline and myself many thanks to Hazel for choosing such a green and interesting route for our pilgrimage.

Bishop Richard writes

In many ways we are living in very anxious and uncertain times at every level of our lives. On a global level, we are still firmly in the grip of the Covid pandemic with its huge impact on all our lives. Many of our vital systems from healthcare to economics are looking very fragile. The pandemic has had major implications for our church life and raised many questions about how this will continue to flourish into the future. In addition, the even greater challenges of climate change and the environment are very much in our minds and especially with the major international COP26 conference in Glasgow in the first half of November. Whether or not that will produce the level of political and economic agreement which will seriously impact on the tremendous challenges of climate change remains to be seen.

If we add into these global issues all the stresses and strains of our own individual lives, whether those are to do with our relationships, our livelihoods, or our spiritual, mental and physical well-being, then we have a major challenge in getting the right mind-set and approach to living our lives as Christians at this stage of the 21st century. Having had in recent

weeks the personal challenge of complications following ankle surgery in August (thankfully now resolving), which resulted in some time off, I have been able to reflect a little on these matters.

It seems to me very important that we are clear about our theological understanding of the events of our lives, and indeed all that goes on not only on planet Earth, but across the universe. This means, of course, seeing everything in the light of the God, who is our Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier, our beginning and our end, in whom we live and move and have our being. The month of November gives us plenty of opportunity to reflect on this, both personally and in our regular worship. At the beginning of the month we celebrate All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day, which remind us of the importance of seeing our life on Earth in the light of our mortality and the whole company of Earth and Heaven.

At the end of November, we remember Christ the King and Advent Sunday, which emphasise the saving work of God in Christ through all time. In particular, the belief that God was in Christ, reconciling all things and that this saving love of God will triumph in the end.

In our worship and prayer we seek to let this faith in God's saving work shape the way we think and live. In a time of so much fear and anxiety this is more important than ever. It is very easy to respond to the challenges of our times with either despair or crippling fear. We certainly do not want a facile optimism which trivialises the scale of the problems we face, but we do need a profound theological and spiritual hope for the future. This involves careful balance between diligence (doing all that is within our powers to shape our own lives and our world for good), and detachment, in the sense of the great spiritual writers, that is a deep sense that God is at work in all things, no matter how difficult our situation may seem.

As we live and pray for our world in these challenging times, I hope and pray that we will all have time to reflect on the deep themes that All Saints, All Souls, Christ the King and Advent Sunday remind us of this month, and that we will find an approach to life in which we are not overwhelmed by fear and despair, but have a genuine realistic hope, which is grounded in the saving love of God in Christ.

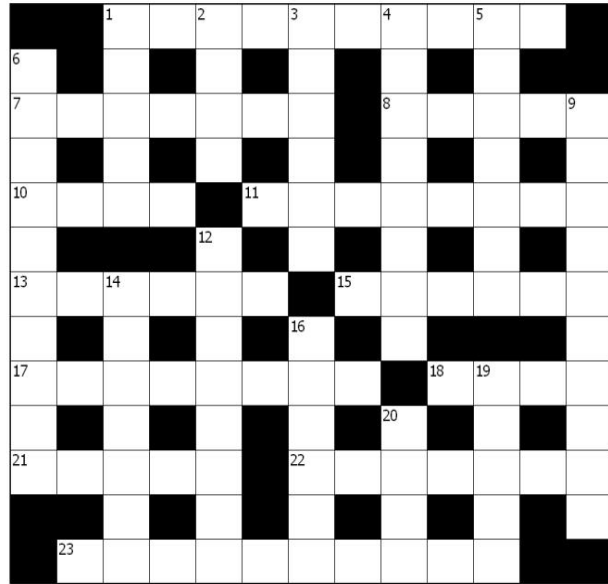
