REFLECTION – Hazel O'Sullivan

I wonder if you have a memory of a great day out somewhere.

Maybe a time on holiday somewhere with family. Maybe a special occasion where lots of friends got together. Maybe a trip to the beach or some beautiful gardens.

I remember one afternoon on holiday in Ireland – before children – when John and I were driving along a country road beside a lake. And the track playing on our CD player in the car was "Have I told you lately that I love you" by Van Morrison. I suspect that we did some walking on that day and had something good to eat in the evening, but I don't remember any of the detail, except that driving by the lake and the music playing at the time. Although I have a very clear image in my mind of what it was like, it's really difficult to describe it to you now, so that you could have that same experience. It's a bit like the Seamus Heaney poem – *Postscript*:

And some time make the time to drive out west Into County Clare, along the Flaggy Shore, In September or October, when the wind And the light are working off each other So that the ocean on one side is wild With foam and glitter, and inland among stones The surface of a slate-grey lake is lit By the earthed lightning of a flock of swans, Their feathers roughed and ruffling, white on white, Their fully grown headstrong-looking heads Tucked or cresting or busy underwater. Useless to think you'll park and capture it More thoroughly. You are neither here nor there, A hurry through which known and strange things pass As big soft buffetings come at the car sideways And catch the heart off guard and blow it open.

As it says in the poem, it's impossible to capture that moment to revisit it again in the same way – even with photos, a video and music to help. You need to have been there to appreciate it fully and be moved by it.

The poem talks about coastal breezes buffeting a car and threatening to catch the heart off guard, and so I think our hearts must be willing to be surprised by our experiences, ever open to receiving and learning from them, so that growth can

happen. This is the only way in which wisdom can be formed. That learning and growth might be sparked by a photo. It might involve telling others about the experience gained. It will definitely require some reflection on the experience and, if that can be done prayerfully, God might speak to you through the Spirit. Because if you're not able to have space for that reflection, the experience will be lost forever from the memory and no learning and growth takes place.

But, of course, this being open to the moment and learning from our experiences will also involve change, which might be a bit scary.

I wonder if you recognise either of these people? Although they are pictured here as babies, they are both women who you would all immediately recognise if you were to meet them today.





We know that we all change over time. Without such change, these babies would never have grown into the women you know today. This growth sometimes has to include changing our mind about something, maybe through seeing it in a new light. This is true wisdom.

For example, I wonder what you wanted to be when you were a child. I wanted to be an aeroplane pilot. No matter that I'd never flown at the time, this was something that I wanted to do. Since that time, my understanding of what's involved in such a job has changed, as well as the actual job changing through technological developments and the wider use of flight as a means of transport. My own likes and dislikes have also changed through the experiences that I have had. I do enjoy travelling abroad, but there are many reasons why I am very glad that I never ended up pursuing this career choice.

And this process of changing of our mind might include something about God. Although he never changes, our understanding of him will and the world around us also changes, so that we gain different experiences of him. The way that I see God today is different to how I saw God when I was younger.

In the reading from John, Jesus is telling the disciples that, now that he will no longer be physically with them, their hearts (which are already touched by his example and teaching) must be open to the Spirit of truth, as this is how they will continue to be guided by God and to find his glory. This speaking of the Spirit can come in many ways – through the Bible, through other written or spoken words, or through things that we see. It's through all of our experiences that God speaks. The disciples must be willing to be surprised, comforted and challenged by what they receive in each new moment from their living Lord. Can we also do that today – be open to the Spirit?

Spend some time now reflecting on the following aspects of God (Father, Son and Holy Spirit):

- How has your understanding of God changed since you were a small child?
- How has the world around you changed?
- How has your relationship with God changed over this time?
- How has this impacted your relationship with others?

We often find it hard to admit that our perception of God has changed, because this involves realising that we may have been mistaken before. But just as our lives are only revealed slowly over time, so our relationship with God is only revealed slowly through the work of the Spirit of truth. Obviously, this means that over time our relationship with God and with each other will change.

Just as we can only recall those great experiences from our past if we've reflected on them, so our relationship with God will only be developed and our faith deepened, if we are open to receive and learn from our experiences, so that some growth can happen and wisdom develop. This is the work of the Spirit - a critical part of the God in whom we believe.

Amen

And who are those two women who were pictured earlier as babies? So as to not spoil the surprise for those who will be at the services on Sunday, I'll reveal this then and in the pew sheet next week.

Prayer Pointers

Pray that our faith and our relationship with God may be deepened and matured by listening to the promptings of the Holy Spirit. May we be surprised, comforted and challenged by each encounter with the Spirit.

Pray for our two congregations of St Mary's and St Francis. Pray that we may rejoice in what we have on common and not what makes us different. Pray that we may be open to change and new possibilities for us in worship, social interaction and working in our community.

Pray for all politicians that they may have a sense of purpose, duty and see once again the ways they can impact their communities for the good. As a church, help us to model a community where different people, with very different backgrounds and politics can come together and show love and appreciation for each other.

Pray for the Ukrainian people who are being welcomed by families in the UK. May the people arriving find places of safety where they can rebuild their lives. Help these new households to grow together and learn from one another.

Hold before God all those we know who are sick, especially those suffering from cancer and undergoing treatment. In our congregations we pray for those struggling with ill health – especially Vicky Pearce, Mike East and Pat Allegacone – and those known to God alone.

Pray for all who have died recently, especially Julie Bailey and for her daughters Pippa and Zazine and her wider family and friends. Thank God for the example of her life – for her laughter and joy even when faced with illness.

Offer our own personal prayers and thanksgivings. We entrust to God all those things that worry us; those situations we feel helpless in; those decisions that burden us; those losses that overwhelm us, and all that we are thankful for.
