LETTER FROM RICHARD

Dear friends,

Outside church circles, "sin" is not a word that one encounters very often, other than in contexts which suggest that it is not being taken very seriously, the sort of contexts that give rise to comments like "naughty but nice" or "a second on the lips, a lifetime on the hips." And if you were to ask the average person on the street if they regarded themselves as sinful, they would probably look at you in amazement. Indeed I think that many of us who are Christians might admit to having weaknesses or faults, but wouldn't really consider ourselves to be sinners, even after the self-reflection which we are encouraged to undertake in Lent. (Is there anything that has emerged this Lent that you feel calls for repentance?)

Yet St Paul in his letter to the church in Rome states that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (3.23) So what is sin? In brief, it's everything that comes between us and God. As the Israelites tried to put into words where they stood in relation to God, they described sin as disobedience to God's will - as exhibited in the Garden of Eden – the abuse of God's gift of free will.

Alongside the trivialising of sin which I've referred to earlier, there's a tendency for us to see it in the world around us, but not in ourselves. So the war in Ukraine is evil - another way of talking about sin - as is human trafficking, domestic abuse, sexual exploitation, racism and so forth. And all these are actions of human beings, sometimes undertaken by groups, sometimes by individuals. But all involve people like you and me.

Moreover, it is possible to sin unwittingly. If war is evil, then the manufacture of weapons must also be evil, since these make war possible. So what about being employed by an arms company? Or what about investing your savings in a bank or investment company that holds shares in arms companies, or tobacco companies, or fossil fuel extractors? Paul wasn't joking when he said that "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."

Stuart Townsend recognises this in one of his songs that we frequently sing around Easter time, when he writes of Christ hanging on the cross: "It was my sin that held Him there." Now I don't suppose that Stuart Townsend is any more sinful than you or me, who will be singing these words in a few weeks' time, but he did recognise what Paul was getting at.

Now if you're still reading this, I do agree with you that it all sounds a bit negative, but I think that if we're fully to appreciate what Easter means, then we need to think about what Good Friday tells us. And it tells us that sin needs to be taken seriously, very seriously, because it caused God, in the person of Jesus, to undergo the most horrendous suffering and death.

But on Easter Day, we see that Jesus has come through that suffering, that he has conquered sin and death, that, to quote Cecil Frances Alexander, he has paid "the price of sin," so that we are redeemed and the riches of God's kingdom are open to us, both now and throughout eternity. And that is something in which to rejoice. Happy Easter. *Richard*

Stephen has spread huge sheets of paper on the hall floor, and together with Phillip, is encouraging some very messy 'mood' painting. Margaret is using pictures cut out from calendars for the children to make Mother's Day gifts by adding interesting drawings and messages. Kate and Jean are talking to children about how they feel today – happy, sad, excited... and paper plates with a moving pointer will be taken home when appropriate mood faces and expressions have been added. Geoff and Ken are spilling water and glitter, and the resulting prayer/thinking bottles are going home to help concentration. (Well, that's the plan....) Richard and Anne are telling the story of Hannah whose prayers were answered in the birth of baby Samuel. Hannah probably didn't wear a robe made of a washing-up cloth, but our cardboard figures are really rather splendid. Hazel is on the 'meet and greet' table and keeps all our paperwork in order as well as making everyone feel very welcome. Kay is hanging some of the children's "Thank you, Sorry, Please" prayers on the tree branch which Stephen rescued from the ground, and is also helping children to make TeaSPoon cards to take home

as a reminder. The children's prayers are wonderfully individual, God is thanked for sunshine, bunnies, football, families and lots more besides. In the kitchen Annette and Cheryl (this is Beryl's week off) are busy cooking 70 fish fingers, slicing lettuce, putting crisps in bowls, making drinks, etc., etc., and, as usual, everything is running like clockwork.

When it is about twenty to five, off we go into the church where Hazel leads a carefully planned celebration service. We all sing "If you're happy and you know it" and "He's got the whole world in His hands" while Geoff attempts to keep us in tune, and as well as telling the story of Hannah, Hazel uses the children's own prayers. One has already been answered – a request for sunshine was granted during the afternoon even if we have to wait longer for the warm temperature which was also asked for.

Next – it's back in the hall where adults and children sit around a very long table and enjoy the tasty meal – fish finger wraps, followed by chocolate rolls. "Would you like orange squash, blackcurrant squash or just plain water with that?" There's lots of chat and lots of happy faces and, thank goodness, there was enough food to feed 36 people.

This is church, but not as you might know it. A small group of helpers meet and plan everything well in advance of each month's session and we then work from written plans, so we all know what's going to happen. We use lots of recycled resources – we need to save money as well as the environment. Donations from our visitors covered the costs of all the food this month and a kind cash donation, from a member of the congregation who would probably prefer to remain anonymous, enabled us to purchase some much-needed glue sticks too. As the families go home with lots of smiles and thank-yous everything is cleared away before the tired helpers rush home. (Some of us will be back for choir practice in less than an hour!)

There were eighteen children together with parents and helpers here in March. It would be wonderful to welcome a few new helpers to our team so that experienced helpers could have an extra pair of hands on their activity table. Since we started Messy Church at St. Mary's we have lost several helpers due to illness or mobility issues. Three very special helpers, Jan, Cynthia and very recently Barbara Plummer have gone to a better place and are much missed. Would you like to join us? We have helpers from St. Mary's, St. Francis and St. John's, all are welcome! If you are interested in joining us, please let Kay know, or have a chat with any of the people mentioned above, - plus Alison who couldn't join us in March due to having Covid.

Our next Messy Church is on Friday April 21st, and then on the second Friday of each month. It would be great to see some new faces and you too could have Messy fun, food and fellowship.



Two items that were stored away with all these papers were a prayer (which we think she wrote) and a revised wording of psalm 23, both of which many people found quite moving.


Barbara's prayer


