

St Paul recognised this in his letter to Timothy:


All scripture is inspired by God and is useful ... so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work. (2 Timothy 3:16-17)



Festival of Art

Cost of Living Crisis - A Christian Response

Birkenhead food bank says some users 'not eaten for days': I avoid meals so my daughter can eat: Student nurse down to her last pound: One in three London children living in poverty, charity warns.

These are just a small sample of the headlines on the BBC News website covering the cost-of-living crisis. Sixteen million people in Britain have been forced to cut back on food and other essentials. Some 24 million people also reduced energy use in their homes between March and June 2022 as the price of gas and electricity reached record highs. The cost of gas and electricity is predicted to rise even further in the autumn.

Local Foodbanks are struggling to keep up with demand. As an example, donations to Bromley Foodbank have dropped almost 75% since 2020. Their Chief Operating Officer, Amanda Stone, said "Donations have dropped significantly because everyone is trying to save their pennies because of the cost-of-living crisis." The foodbank has seen many people visiting recently who have never used a foodbank before, including nurses and teachers who work full-time and often are unaware of how the process works to claim benefits (often referred to as "The Working Poor"). The manager added: "May and June are usually our quietest months because it's warmer so people are spending less on their energy bills. The cost-of-living crisis means that's not been the case this year. My real fear is if it's like this now, what's it going to be like

in winter when it's really cold and people need to heat their homes?"

How can we, as Christians, with a real concern for the welfare of our communities, respond to this growing crisis? You may remember that at our joint service in St Francis on 1st May, we had a speaker from Christians Against Poverty (CAP). One of the CAP initiatives that is very relevant to the current cost-of-living crisis is their 'Money Course'. This is a free 3 session course that is designed to be run by local churches and helps people to budget, save and prevent debt. The system uses three accounts, so participants can make sure money is going towards the things planned for in an individual's budget. It is not just for people who are in debt, but is for anyone, whatever their income, who would like to get better control of their money.

CAP also offer free debt advice and practical assistance for those already struggling with the burden of debt. Here's a quote from someone who has really benefitted from this CAP service:

"I was owing well over £20,000. I hid it from anyone else, from everyone else, I didn't even want to open my doors. So, I shut my door, I shut my mind to everything else. It was that part of me that I just thought, "No, nobody needs to know. To be debt-free is very, very peaceful. It feels like heaven. It feels very, very liberating knowing that I have a second chance. I'm excited even talking about it." We at St Francis' and St Mary's would like to run the Money Course and Bo Povlsen from St Francis' is already trained as a coach. However, we need more volunteers to be trained by CAP to assist Bo in delivering the sessions. The training is just one session, and this is frequently offered on 'Zoom' where you can take part from the comfort of your home. You don't have to be a financial wizard to understand the training material – it's all very much common sense. Rehema Trust: a charity supported by St Mary's

Rehema Trust was set up six years ago in memory of Jan Mason's sister, Barbara Leighton, to support the work of Barbara Academy, a primary school based in a very poor community in rural Western Kenya.

After a difficult period dominated by Covid-19, life has returned to something much more normal, but global issues continue to have a significant impact on the Kenyan economy:

- The war in Ukraine has resulted in increased costs of farming fertiliser and basic food items such as maize.
- Climate change results in unpredictable rainfall, putting at risk Kenya's capacity to provide home-grown food until the next harvest.

The wider cost of living agenda directly affects the running costs of Barbara Academy, where food is a vital contribution to the health and wellbeing of the pupils, and a bus is operated to transport those pupils who have been attracted from further afield by the growing reputation of Barbara Academy.

Thanks to your generous and faithful support, we have been able to expand both the facilities and the range of activities at Barbara Academy, including:-

- Recruiting 120 pupils to complete the development of the Primary School;
- Constructing and fitting out another classroom, accommodating the most senior pupils;

• Extending electricity to all classrooms and giving IT access to all pupils through additional computers and Wi-Fi equipment.

We have also been able to construct some new pupil latrines and to maintain the access road, which regularly suffers from the effects of increasingly extreme weather conditions.

We want to continue educating local children (whose families are unable to pay even the modest fees in place), but we face the challenge of matching monthly operating costs with the same level of regular giving – made that little bit more difficult by the exchange rate moving against us. Our income shortfall is something like £150 per month, which has to come from our modest reserves – if you are able to contribute towards bridging this gap by considering even a small increase in your current support, it would make such a difference.

Looking ahead we hope to improve the ratio of textbooks to pupils (currently one textbook is typically shared between four pupils). Our Grade 6 pupils will complete their primary education at Barbara Academy in December and then face the challenge of moving to secondary schools, where even state day schools require fees that are a challenge for some families to afford.

We already know that we are making a real difference to many young lives.






