LETTER FROM RICHARD

Dear friends,

The primary school I went to was typical of the fifties, in that tradition was important. So each year we put on a Christmas concert, and each year the songs and carols were allocated to the same year group. So it was that I first heard the "Cowboy Carol" sung by what we now call Year 6. I don't why it was – perhaps because, just like every other boy at the time, I was into Cowboys and Indians in a big way – but that was the carol I wanted to sing and was both envious of the year group that got to sing it and desperate for it to be my year group's turn to do the honours.

Many, many years later I was delighted to become reacquainted with the carol when it was sung at The Big Christmas Sing (this isn't a plug for The BCS, but it is on Saturday December 3rd, in case you weren't aware!). What struck me then, but hadn't when I was younger, is that the lyrics don't actually mention Christmas, Christ or indeed any of the events associated with the Nativity. But they do encapsulate what lies at the centre of our Christmas celebrations, right from the opening line: "There'll be a new world beginning from tonight."

For that is what Christmas is all about – new beginnings. Of course, the birth of any child is a new beginning, but the birth of Jesus was a birth that changed the course of history in so many ways, but critically it meant that history was going somewhere and that each and every individual life was meaningful. History's destination is no longer defined by our sun becoming just another burnt out star. Instead God has promised us at the end of time a new heaven and a new earth. And each of us no longer needs to

stare into the abyss of oblivion. Instead we can look forward to an eternity spent in the presence of the God who first created this finite universe.

One new beginning follows another as January dawns, so may I commend to you another line from the Cowboy Carol, "When I climb into the saddle, going to take Him to my heart." I appreciate that not many of us are horse riders, but all of us, I think, can subscribe to the second part of the sentence as one of our New Year resolutions.

May I be the first to wish you a blessed Christmas and a splendid 2023.



This God – how perfect are his deeds!



A Reflection on Black History Month

Black History Month has been celebrated in the UK every October since 1987, in museums, schools and workplaces. The event was officially recognised by the U.S.A government in 1976 and is celebrated there in February. It is an opportunity to look back through our shared history, and to honour and celebrate the contributions black people have made in the past and to reflect on their achievements.

Remembering particular periods of our history can be painful and challenging. We can think of the inhumane brutality of slavery when black people were taken from their homeland against their will and transported to foreign shores. We can imagine the challenges, struggles and hardships they encountered including rejection, racism, and the feeling of their voices not being heard. They are commended for their courage and desire to move forward shaping a new vision for the future.

Much of the Old Testament charts the movement of the people of Israel en masse from Egypt. This was a momentous event by all those embarking on this unique and perilous journey. In the Book of Joshua, Joshua is commissioned by God to continue what Moses has started because the journey is not yet completed, and they have not reached their destination. The weight of responsibility on the shoulders of Joshua must have been immense as he reflected on what Moses had achieved.

Joshua certainly had big shoes to fill. Would they arrive safely? Could he carry out the huge undertaking that had been given to him? He is comforted and reassured by God that he will be with him, and he does not need to rely on his own strength, abilities and knowledge. He can rely on God to lead the Israelites and protect them. Indeed, God repeated three times that Joshua must be strong and courageous, and also be obedient to the law that Moses taught him. It is through relying on that strength from God that Joshua was able to respond to God's call and take up the enormous challenge presented to him and see it through to the end.

Black History Month recognises the bravery, strength and courage of Black people throughout history. It is a history that connects strongly with the movement of the Israelites because of the migration of people to another land. In this case it was from the Caribbean and Africa to Britain, and how it shaped and changed the landscape of British history.

It is important to remember that Black history in Britain can be traced back many centuries, and there is evidence that African people were present in Roman Britain as far back as the 4th Century AD. During the Tudor period in the 1500s there were hundreds of black migrants living in Britain, for example John Blanke, an established African trumpeter who was employed by Henry VIII. John Blanke is featured on a sixty-foot roll with other trumpeters holding the Royal Standard, depicting the prestigious Westminster Tournament of 1511, celebrating the birth of Henry VIII`s son.

It is of course not possible to cover all the prominent black people in British history. However, as examples I want to consider one person and one event that influenced Black British history - the life and achievements of Mary Seacole, and the arrival of the Empire Windrush passenger ship. Mary Seacole was born, as Mary Grant, in Jamaica in 1805, the daughter of a Scottish lieutenant in the British Army and his Caribbean wife. In 1821, she began to travel the world and gained advanced medical knowledge and much sought-after nursing skills. In the 1850s she applied to the war office to become an army nurse to the wounded soldiers in the Crimea (now part of Ukraine), but she was refused. However, Seacole's determination to nurse the wounded soldiers regardless of the barriers and challenges she faced, led her to set up the British Hotel for the wounded, a respite for sick soldiers, and she also nursed the wounded on the Mary Seacole was affectionally known as `Mother battlefield. Seacole`. In recognition of her enormous courage and contribution a statue was erected in her honour (the first statue of a named black woman in Britain) at St. Thomas` Hospital in London, on the 30th June 2016. After a remarkably rich and colourful life, she died in London in 1881.

The Empire Windrush was a passenger ship which carried Caribbean migrants to Britain during the period 1945-1960, on the invitation of the British Government, for employment opportunities in the transport system, Postal service and the National Health Service. They were British citizens with the right to work, enter and settle in Britain. Some who came were servicemen returning from the Second World War, recruited from British colonies. In 1944, West Indian women served in the women's auxiliary air force and Auxiliary Territorial service of Britain. From 1944 to 1945, nearly 5,500 West Indian RAF servicemen came to Britain. Between 1947 and 1970 over half a million people left the Caribbean to live in Britain. The huge contribution made by migrants to Britain helped re-build many industries and services, and they brought with them a rich culture which changed the historical landscape of Britain.

Reflecting on the achievements of black people throughout history is a way of recognising the bravery and courage they needed in order to overcome the many barriers to success, so that their stories become our stories.

Let us continue to build on their legacy, and to respond by thanking God for it, because Black history is everyone's history.

When Things Fall Apart

I am writing this article the day after Liz Truss resigned as Prime Minister. She will go down in history as the shortest-serving prime minister – only in office for just 46 days. The prime minister is humiliated, and the country is in turmoil. A leadership election will be completed quickly, and the UK will have its fifth Prime Minister in just six years. The last month has been a turbulent one. Days after Truss became PM, Queen Elizabeth II died after 70 years on the throne. Chancellor Kwasi Kwarteng then started a financial crisis with his minibudget and resigned closely followed by the Home Secretary. Things politically and nationally have fallen apart.

Sometimes, things fall apart in our own lives too. It can be anything from bereavement, a diagnosis of serious illness, suddenly being made redundant, an eviction, a breakdown of a relationship, being a victim of a crime or a myriad of other issues. As Christians, what is our response when things fall apart? Does the Bible have any answers? How do we pray at these times and how do we cope when our prayers don't seem to be answered – when God seems 'on mute'? How do we support each other when we go through hard times?

I suppose that the classic book in the Bible about someone whose world falls apart is the Book of Job. In essence, the book is about a good, upstanding, God-fearing man who suffers serious illness, the death of his children and servants, and his wife leaves him. He's forced to live in the ashpit. Things couldn't get much worse. Yet, Job doesn't blame God for his predicament. When his wife tells him to 'curse God and die', Job replies 'shall we receive good from God and shall we not receive evil?' Even when Job's friends try to explain away his misfortune saying that it's payback for his sin, Job refuses to believe God would punish him so harshly. Job is patient in his suffering – he

perseveres. It's where we get the expression 'the patience of Job'. He gets no definitive answers from God – indeed, at the end of the book God gives Job a lecture. Job is weak compared to God's omnipotent power. Eventually, Job is healed and his wealth and fortune is restored. Job sees that his vision of God is really very limited. So, no real answers there.

There are many instances in the Bible, especially in the Old Testament, where God strikes at those who sin. So, is God vengeful? When our world falls apart, is that payback for our sin – our mistakes? I don't know about you, but I simply can't believe in a God who makes bad things happen to good people (or bad people either). That's just not compatible with the God who loves us without limit even sending his Son, Jesus, to suffer for us on the cross. When hard times happen in the Bible, we often see the response as a lament. You may remember we had a sermon on lament when we returned to church after the pandemic. Lament is our cry to God – sometimes a rage at Him. Here's part of a lament written by Jane Smith who some of you from St Francis may know. It is based on Psalm 34. These words and feelings, I am sure, will echo our own experiences when our worlds fall apart:

You promise to heal the broken-hearted and save the crushed in spirit,

So why have You departed and left me feeling wretched?

You promise to protect us from all harm so none of our bones are broken,

So where were Your loving arms when I needed them?

You promise to listen when we cry to You in agony,

So why have You not replied to my questioning?

You promise to rescue and deliver us from our fears,

So why aren't You coming quicker to wipe away my tears?

You promise that those who trust in You will lack no good thing,

So why are You oblivious to my suffering?

Jane's words sum up our frustration and searching for meaning and answers – especially when our prayers don't seem to be answered and 'God is on Mute'. There are no easy answers. However, there is hope. We know that we don't go through hard times alone. Jesus has suffered on the cross and he knows what suffering is – he suffers with us.

Someone said to me, when I was facing surgery last year, "just slightly shuffle over on the hospital bed so that Jesus has space to lie alongside you." Those words were a great comfort to me. Often, Jesus comes to us through other people – the kindness of medical staff and carers for example and especially other Christians being alongside us - the 'paraclesis' that we discussed a few years back. For Jesus to 'lie alongside us' in our hard times, we need to make ourselves vulnerable – both in our prayers and with other people. This is not easy. All we can do is to give Jesus space to lie or stand alongside us, because that's how he supports, loves and cares for us when our worlds fall apart.

I heard the bells on Christmas day Their old familiar carols play, And wild and sweet the words repeat Of peace on earth, good will to men.


I thought how, as the day had come, The belfries of all Christendom Had rolled along th'unbroken song Of peace on earth, good will to men.


And in despair I bowed my head: 'There is no peace on earth,' I said 'For hate is strong, and mocks the song Of peace on earth, good will to men.'


