





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LETTER FROM HAZEL

Dear friends,

And so, we begin another new year. I wonder what 2022 will bring. I think that there are many reasons to be cheerful at the start of this new year, which may seem like a strange thing for me to say while writing this in isolation because I have covid. The reason why I say there are reasons to be cheerful are because we are now beginning to learn to live with covid in the same way that we have learned to live with the flu and colds. We can also give thanks that the vaccines are protecting us from having severe forms of this disease. And so, it means that we can have much to look forward to this year – we can book holidays and arrange celebrations without too much risk of them being cancelled.

At the start of each new year, we have themes in our services, driven by the readings, one of which is the wedding at Cana, where Jesus turns water into wine (John 2:1-11). This is Jesus' first miracle and so it is about new beginnings for him. Interestingly Jesus initially says, "my time has not yet come", suggesting that he might be thinking it's too early for him to start in ministry. I wonder if any of you are thinking it's too early to begin going out and about and socialising with others. Jesus found that God provided all that he needed when he trusted in him, with great abundance. And yes, we need to take care to keep us all safe, but I think that we too will gain whatever we need for our interactions with others when we trust in God and plan for events that we can look forward to in a way that was not possible last year. And these interactions might be so much more abundant now that we have been living without them for such a long time.

May God pour out an abundance in your lives this year.

Lent Groups

The Beatitudes have been called the most powerful and beautiful teaching that Jesus gave. The text is found at the beginning of The Sermon on the Mount at Matthew 5:1-12. It was a reading that we had at our wedding, because we knew it to be a pattern for how to have a good life; the best life; the life God intended for you to live. However, I'm not sure that I've really lived up to this in my almost 30 years of marriage.

Why are The Beatitudes so difficult to live out? Maybe, it's because we've forgotten what they are all about. We regularly use Jesus' teaching on prayer - it's called the Lord's Prayer. We know what we believe, as we often say the Creed in our services and we take part in communion, remembering the forgiveness and promise of eternal life given by Jesus. But do we have anything in our services on how to live life today? This is arguably the most important aspect of all of Jesus' teaching and yet it's not included regularly in our liturgy. I think that this is something to do with the fact that the Beatitudes echo the highest ideals of Jesus' teachings on spirituality and compassion, and they are an uncomfortable way of looking at life today. In summary, they call us to:

- spiritual renewal,
- lament for the injustices in the world,
- be prepared to lay aside our status and privilege to enrich others,
- stand up for what is right,
- be honest and real in our relationships, forgiving and accepting, always seeking peace and wholeness.

Are these all things that you are committed to in life?

The Beatitudes are sometimes called the Ten Commandments of the New Testament, as they present a new set of ideals that focus on love and humility, rather than force and exaction. But because they are not set out as clear rules to be followed, they can be difficult to put into practice.

This is all very challenging and following the teaching will mean standing out from the crowd. Christian faith is not a hobby, but a way of life. As challenging as this may be, however, it is a good life that the Beatitudes lead us to, because this is what it means to live as a child of God's kingdom. And that has to be somewhere we'd like to be.

I pray that this year we will take steps toward living more of this life by looking at The Beatitudes in our Lent groups. We will explore what each of the Beatitudes mean and how we might live this kind of life today. If you are not normally part of a home group, do be in touch with a leader to join in for the period of Lent which starts on Wednesday 2nd March this year.

Ash Wednesday

Services



Over the centuries the tradition has developed of burning palm crosses saved from the previous year to use in a service on Ash Wednesday when they are applied to the forehead of those worshippers who choose to receive them in the sign of the cross.

The practice is strongest in the Catholic and Anglican traditions, though several free churches also observe Ash Wednesday, being in part mindful of the Biblical basis of expressing repentance found in the Old and New Testaments. The ashes serve as a reminder of the failings of humanity, both personal and corporate, and the cross a reminder of God's loving, forgiving, salvation.

This year Churches Together in West Wickham are holding two such services on Ash Wednesday, 2nd March:

- A morning service at 10:45am at St Francis' conducted by Revd Hazel O'Sullivan.
- An evening service at 8pm at West Wickham Methodist Church conducted by Deacon Laura MacBean.

The two services will follow the same pattern and have similar content, both include Holy Communion led by the host minister, a sermon given by Revd Richard Ford and the act of ashing.

St. Mary's Christmas Market Saturday, 27th November 2021

Arranging the Market this year was a challenge! We had to take the Covid guidelines into consideration - social distancing, having a well-ventilated hall and ensuring all surfaces (food utensils) were sanitised - to hold an in-person event.

To achieve this, we had to reduce the number of stalls, food had to be served on recyclable disposable tableware and for the first time in circa 25 years, the stalls which add to the Christmas atmosphere, were not erected to create more space in the hall. Stalls were also moved to create more space in the concourse area for eating.

The Secret Santa and Santa's Grotto could not go ahead as there was no ventilation in the rooms they were held in. Another casualty was the delicious hot food usually provided by the Graydon's because we couldn't have too many people in the kitchen. Instead, we used a simplified menu that allowed us to keep within the Covid guidelines.

Despite all the challenges, we managed to create a Christmassy atmosphere in the hall with the streamers, beautifully displayed goods on the red and green tablecloths and the Christmas tree standing tall on the stage!

Snow had been forecast for the day but by God's grace, the day dawned with no snow. We even had to open earlier than 10:30am as there was a queue of people waiting! Throughout the day, there was a steady stream of people coming in and at no point did the hall feel overcrowded. It was a truly blessed day!

Thank you to everyone who generously donated their time in setting up, wrapping up hampers, helping on the day, attending and donating in kind.

We raised over £4k which was due to the generous nature of both churches and our community.



School Governor Roles

Compass Academy Trust is looking to recruit local volunteer school governors within our family of schools (Marian Vian, Unicorn and Wickham Common & Oak Lodge). Local governors do not have to be specialists in education; instead, much of the role is the inquisitiveness to question and analyse; and the willingness to learn. You will be expected to get to know the school through visits, attending events and meeting the staff and students. You also need enthusiasm, commitment and a little spare time.

The local governors work with school leaders to deliver the best education for pupils at our schools and ensure they are nurtured and cared for in a safe environment. We look at a diverse range of matters - from deciding what kind of schools we want to be and thinking about how we want to get there; to setting school priorities and ensuring they are delivered. The Local Governing Body meets every term, currently virtually, to discuss these matters and in turn are accountable to the Board of Trustees. To help local governors in their role you will receive:

- An ongoing programme of training.
- Support and guidance from other members of your governing board (such as a 'buddy')

At BBF, we've been helping those facing food poverty in our local community for over 10 years. It's a big job and it requires lots of volunteers in a wide variety of roles. One of those roles is as a Trustee: we have five and are looking to recruit two more. We hope that one of them might have HR experience, but don't let that stop you applying if you have other attributes that might interest us. For instance, we could learn a lot from a Trustee who has been helped by BBF or another Foodbank.

What you would do as a Trustee:

- As a team: you would sit on our "Trustee Board", which provides strategic direction and oversight for all BBF activities and works to ensure that BBF is properly run.
- At an individual level: you would also be asked to take responsibility for particular aspects of BBF's operations, getting to know what is happening and providing guidance and support in those areas.
- Time commitment: the Trustee Board meets every other month, with one awayday and some training each year in addition to the AGM. The time commitment for your individual responsibilities as a Trustee would be tailored to fit your circumstances.

What we are looking for in our Trustees

- A blend of different skills and experience: we want people from different backgrounds with a wide range of talents to bring to bear in their Trustee role.
- A willingness to learn: we don't require Trustees to have previous experience of being a trustee or to understand the legal responsibilities and liabilities it entails; we can help you learn about them and the other aspects of your role as a Trustee.
- Diversity: we would like our Trustee Board to reflect the ethnic, gender and other diversity of our clients and the staff and volunteers who work for us.
- Supportive of our ethos: we require each of our Trustees to be supportive of our collective Trustee Board responsibility to maintain BBF's Christian identity and ethos.
- Commitment: to be a Trustee you need to be committed to BBF and its aims, to devote the necessary time and effort to fulfil your responsibilities and to work well as part of a cheerful and dynamic team.

Croydon: Central Zimbabwe parish links Update from Zimbabwe – January 2022

The celebration of the 40th Anniversary of the Diocese of Central Zimbabwe had to be postponed by a couple of months, but on 27th November over 2,000 people attended a memorable event in Kwekwe. Here are pictures from the Mother's Union Facebook page:





There was a virtual presence at this event from the Croydon-Zimbabwe Link in the form of a pre-recorded video message. This was greatly valued by those in Zimbabwe as it showed solidarity and gave great encouragement. \$36,000 was raised through various events associated with the anniversary celebrations and this will be used to construct diocesan offices.

Thanks are being given to God as the rains have been very good (although they arrived late). It is hoped that there will be a good harvest.

There is much political activity as there are by-elections that happened in December, and more are coming up in late March.

The virus is now subsiding. Not many are getting sick, and the effects are not devastating. Enough doses of the vaccination are available for everyone to have it, but there is still some hesitancy. 3 million have been vaccinated (nationally 45% have had one dose and 34% two doses) and a booster programme has now started. Bishop Ignatius is reported to be going onto the radio to encourage the uptake of vaccinations.

There is now no limit on the number who are allowed to meet in church, as long as they are vaccinated. Unvaccinated people are forbidden by law from gathering with others. Church income has gone up as a result, but not to pre-Covid levels, as people's incomes have reduced.

Schools have remained closed in January to contain infections, but now that daily deaths are in single figures, it is hoped that there will be more opening up soon. The public have responded well to the reduction in the regulations.

On diocesan projects, the following progress has been made:

• A grant of \$300,000 has been approved for the solar plant at St. Patrick's, and when the project is complete, St. Patrick's will be able to sell electricity to the government where there is excess generated above its own requirements.

- The insurance partnership project with the communications company Econet to set up a self-managed insurance scheme has taken off and the diocese is now selling insurance as an agent on a commission.
- Horticultural projects last year, especially around garlic and tomatoes, have made the diocese and churches less dependent on the offerings they receive, and it is hoped that this will continue this year.

The Mothers Union in Zimbabwe have been meeting virtually recently, but back in November, their president, Flora Makumbe (wife of Bishop Ignatius) and other members of a team have visited many of the churches in the diocese to advocate for breaking the silence against Gender Based Violence.

Mike & Fiona Smith Update on Ear Aid Nepal

On 16th December, 2021, Mike and Fiona Smith sent greetings to friends and family with love to all for a wonderful Christmas, and attached their latest news.

Elizabeth exclaims in a loud voice:
Blessed are you among women and blessed is the child
you will bear! As soon as the sound of your greeting
reached my ears, the baby in my womb leaped for joy".
Luke 1.42-44

These verses remind us of Jesus special entrance to the world at the first Christmas, and the importance of hearing!

Mike is now back in Nepal. We both left Nepal in late January 2020, planning to return after a few weeks spent with family. Unfortunately, Fiona's Mum was taken unwell, so Mike returned to Nepal alone in early March and returned to England on the same day that the UK lockdown began. It was 20 months later that Mike managed to get back, just a few weeks ago. Mike's mum now has a place in an excellent residential home near us in Hereford. Fiona's mum will soon move to residential nursing care.

Because of all this and also being unsure of what Mike could contribute in Nepal now that the Ear Centre at INF Green Pastures Hospital has been running without his direct input for

a long time, he returned with some trepidation! Mike has been able to get fully involved and has been operating almost every day.

During Covid, although the hospital was quiet, a trickle of patients and surgery continued, so thankfully the staff were almost all retained. We were able to appoint a senior audiologist, who really upgraded our hearing tests and hearing aid fittings. Mike returned to Nepal with new and serviced equipment purchased by the charity, as well as a large supply of donated new and used hearing aids.

We give thanks that so many patients get help each day. Mike had been challenged by the need to offer services in some new areas such as cosmetic reconstruction of the outer ear, in those born without an ear. This is notoriously difficult but is a frequent request as it affects things like marriage prospects.

Our time in the UK was also fruitful. Fiona has worked with a local organisation called Care in the Community speaking with and visiting clients struggling with health or other problems. Mike has also been a vaccinator for a day most weeks.

Our church in the UK, at Bodenham chapel kept meeting either by zoom or in person, and our church in Nepal have also returned to face to face meetings and Mike has really enjoyed re-joining them. We loved having family come over from Australia for three months in the summer and we had wonderful breaks together in Port Appin, Scotland. We are all looking forward to a family wedding, probably in Spain in '23!




Parish Magazine


